



Coel Moore wears a gold Trinity College of Florida ring on his right hand, It reminds him of one of his greatest personal and professional achievements: graduating from college, "When you haven't finished your degree, it is something deep down inside you are embarrassed about. Finally having finished something I should have finished a long time ago is awesome," says Joel, a husband and father of three. Finishing his college degree at Trinity College through the adult degree completion program, known as TrinityQuest, has provided Joel with a deep sense of personal satisfaction while unlocking opportunity in his career.

Having a Goal
A Tampa native, Joel Moore grew up in the Bay area and graduated from Boca Ciega High School in Gulfport, Florida, He began his college career taking classes at St. Petersburg Junior College but left before finishing. He later enrolled and graduated from a technical institute with training in biomedical machinery and technology; however, he never completed his college degree - a reality which haunted him in his adult years. Married to his wife Amy, with three young boys, loel was concerned about the example he was setting for his children in completing his education. "The way I look at it. you have three options: don't finish, finish, or finish strong. I didn't want to reach a point when my kids looked at me and said, 'Dad, you did fine without finishing,' I wanted better," Joel recounts.

As a Territory Manager and Regional Field Trainer for Olympus and Gyrus ACMI, two of the world's leading suppliers of medical visualization and energy systems, Joel spends much of his week in the operating room assisting doctors and medical teams with equipment designed to improve surgery outcomes. A busy career and full home life left little room for Joel to return to the classroom to finish his college degree. He had explored other ways of completing his degree but found them to be restrictive in their time commitment or unnecessarily long to complete. "All of the other alternatives that I had taken a look at would take me five-plus years to finish and I would be spending multiple nights away from home. That was too many nights a week to finish-up my degree and I couldn't do that and be away from my family," remembers Joel.

Beginning a Quest

It was around this time when Joel discovered Trinity College of Florida's accelerated degree completion program, TrinityQuest. After talking with an admissions counselor and exploring the program, Joel began to see the exciting possibility of finally completing his college degree. "The workload fit into my work and home schedule." I wanted the challenge of finishing but it had to be realistic. I wanted to get it done without bringing my personal life to a screeching halt. For me, it was the most realistic way to finish my degree.'

Still, loel had concerns about his own ability to reenter college life. It has been several years since he had entered a classroom or cracked a text book, but he mustered the courage and took a step of faith to enroll in the TrinityQuest program. "It had been a long time since I had been in a classroom environment. Honestly, initially I was scared to death wondering if I would be able to remember the things I needed to remember." Where Joel saw fear, he found faculty who were passionate about his personal success and committed to seeing him achieve his goal. "At the end of the day the teachers I had were really investing in us and they wanted us to succeed. There was nobody that was trying to trip you up or make things unduly complicated. They really wanted you to succeed." And succeed is what Joel did. In 2005 he graduated from Trinity College of Florida with a Bachelor of Science degree in management and ethics. Finally, years after he had begun his college career, Joel completed the one thing which was left undone in his life. He had achieved his goal of becoming a college graduate.

Fulfilling a Desire

Joel completed his college degree and quickly began to see opportunities open. "I have had a lot of opportunities to go to work for other companies or take different management opportunities with my own company that never would have been an option for me," touts Joel. He has also seen his professional standing within the company grow. Joel is a member of his company's President's Club, a group of the top ten performers in the organization; he has been tasked with training new employees who join Olympus and Gyrus ACMI in sales and service. For almost twenty years, Joel Moore has worked in the health care industry in medical sales and service; yet, he understands his career is not his total existence. "There is a balance with the business. I want to provide well for my family and be committed to my work but at the same time it is just part of my life. I want to perform at a high level, but my family life is a priority for me."

Joel has also been a committed member of his local church, the First Baptist Church of Indian Rocks in Indian Rocks, Florida, where he teaches an adult Sunday school class, serves as a Deacon and member of the Stewardship committee, and volunteers on Wednesday nights as a worker in the church's youth ministry. Joel has also traveled outside the country to minister to those in need. He recently returned from a mission trip to the Dominican Republic where he worked with the mission organization Score International. "Often we get caught-up in our day-to-day lives and I think that when you go on a mission trip, you get to be part of the frontlines for a little while," believes Joel. It is this kind of balance between his personal and professional life that keeps Joel in spiritual, emotional, and professional health.


Issuing a Call

Joel enjoys his career and appreciates the impact he makes in the lives of doctors and the patients they treat. "You get to make a difference. Getting to see doctors light-up - seeing they are able to do something that provides better outcomes and shorter surgical times for the patient is rewarding," exclaims Joel. He also appreciates his time at Trinity College of Florida, "It was a great experience. The personal encouragement and time people invested with me was really great."

When asked about others who are considering completing their degree through TrinityQuest at Trinity College of Florida, Joel simply says, "What are you waiting for. Typical students in the program are employed full-time and are able to complete their bachelor's degree in about two years by attending classes one day

a week. This allows them to maintain their professional careers and personal commitments. Classes are designed for the working adult and are taught by highly qualified professors who relate to adult students and strive to make each course an exciting and valuable learning experience.

The Top Five Myths about Completing a College Degree

Myths do not really exist. They are unfounded ideas people believe and, if not confronted, can stop individuals from taking steps to achieve their goals. The following are the top five myths plaguing individuals who are considering finishing their college education.

Myth #1

You can't go to college and have a full-time job and family.

Trinity College of Florida's accelerated degree completion program, TrinityQuest, was designed to take into consideration the challenges working adults face when returning to the classroom. Students do not need to sacrifice their family or jeopardize their job. Traditional higher education paradigms have been shattered in favor of non-traditional student educational needs. It is no longer necessary to be on the college campus every day of the week. Instead of taking six courses at the same time over a traditional sixteen-week semester, TrinityQuest students meet just one day a week taking one course at a time. Most courses are completed in five weeks. Once the class is successfully completed, students take the next course.

Myth #2

I can't handle the workload. I just can't do it.

TrinityQuest creates an atmosphere in which it becomes easier to succeed. Faculty and staff are all committed to helping each student excel in the classroom. One TrinityQuest student makes this comment about his experience, "I'm surrounded by people who want to be there and through a lot of extraordinary circumstances are coming to class. Although they may have a lot of responsibilities in their home and work life, they still make coming to class a priority. We all want to be there."

Myth #3

College is filled with teenagers and early twentysomethings. I'm too old to go to college.

The Association for Nontraditional Students in Higher Education reports that students who are over 25 make up 47 percent of the new and returning student population on many of today's college campuses. TrinityQuest students are adults with real life experiences. They are adults seeking career change or advancement. They are

newly empty nesters, retirees, non-clergy, and church leaders enrolling in classes. It is never too late to go back to college. Many of these students are finishing a degree, seeking a second degree, changing careers, or updating professional credentials.

Myth #4

It's too expensive. There is no way I can afford it.

TrinityQuest provides a flexible and unique way for non-traditional students to return and finish their degree at an affordable price. A college degree often means increased income, new skills, and a competitive advantage in the workplace, Recently, ABC's *Good Morning America* interviewed leading economist Warren Buffet regarding how to invest in a sluggish economy. His advice to the nation was, "...invest in yourself". Higher Education is exactly that, an investment in your future. Financial aid is available for most students in the form of federal grants and student loans.

Myth #5

I'm the only one that didn't finish college.

All across the country there are millions of adults who have some college experience, yet have never fulfilled their dream of earning their bachelor's degree. The last U.S. Census showed that more than 2.5 million Floridians, ages 25 to 64, have completed a significant amount of college work but never finished their degree. You are not alone. 

A ten-week mission trip to a foreign country can be intimidating and overwhelming, especially if it's your first. Whether it is people from the Ukraine, Nigeria, Thailand, the United States or Peru, everyone needs the same Savior. A mission trip shows you the urgency of the times. Every follower of Christ needs to build deliberate relationships for the purpose of sharing the Gospel. From foreign lands to the homeland, we must make disciples. In Matthew 28:19. Christ tells His disciples to, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations." He is directing us not only to go, but to make disciples; while in Peru I finally realized the full meaning of this command.

Geographic Adjustment
At the start of the summer, my teammates and I traveled from Florida

to Peru. We arrived with a hundred other summer missionaries to attend a week of training and orientation. There we learned the local culture, how to "story" with people using the Scriptures, and to make what we do reproducible. Following the first week of training, we arrived at Matucana to visit various believers and experience the existing relationships established by previous teams.

The town of Matucana is located in southern Peru about three hours from Lima. This city was selected by the First Baptist Church of New Port Richey as a site to support Kingdom building efforts. The church is working to plant new churches with the Rapid Entry Advance Plan South (REAP South), a branch of the Southern Baptist International

Mission Board in South America. Each summer, REAP South sends college students to villages which U.S. churches have adopted. REAP South employs methods which are different from many mission groups. Being my first mission trip, I thought I would be part of a team that would hold VBS for children, distribute tracts, and construct buildings. However, those techniques are not what REAP South is doing in Peru. Their mission is to plant churches by entering villages with a Bible, a backpack, and nothing more. Through building relationships and sharing stories from the Bible, they teach the fundamental Christian truths: everyone is sinful, needs a Savior, and Christ has paid the penalty for man's sin and desires obedience.

Ministry Adjustment
Because of several churches' work, we were able to instantly become

involved with groups of believers. Two Christians, Jose and Elizabeth, held a Bible study in their store every Sunday evening. They had been believers for many years but were unable to find a suitable church in the area. They had been meeting regularly for several months, but were not confident in their leadership ability. We encouraged them to carefully plan the meetings from week to week; by the time we left, they were certain about their focus for the next couple of months and had led two communion services.

While in Matucana, we met believers like Gary whom we were able to disciple. As a chef he spent much time working in Chosica, a nearby city. Gary was eager to learn more about Christ and we spent



times he brought his unsaved friends to the study so they could also hear the message of Jesus Christ. Julie, another Christian believer, owned a sweets and juices shop. She had been a Christian for a couple of months and was baptized the first week we were in Matucana. She desired to study the differences between other religions and Christianity. Although she suffered persecution from friends, she was not discouraged from following Christ. Her faith grew over the summer because of many answered prayers and she began sharing the Bible with her family.

Strategy Adjustment

Living in Matucana for over two months opened many opportunities for evangelism. Teaching English became one of our main ways to evangelize. Three days a week we taught English in one of the elementary schools. The class time focused around a Bible story. After school, the children would share how they remembered the story and wanted to hear more. A class for municipal workers was started and each class was exciting. The first part of the class was spent teaching English, while the second half was spent studying the Scriptures. On one occasion after finishing the Bible story, the students asked us to teach a Christian song in English; we obliged and taught them, "Jesus Loves Me." The municipal class was always eager to learn English and about God. Besides teaching English, we had the opportunity to share our testimonies. In July, a team from Virginia joined us for a week. Stephen, a member of the team, was a retired police officer. He went by the local police station to trade patches and hats. While talking with the asked if we could speak with the officers and share a Bible story. The

chief agreed and the next night Stephen shared his testimony and the gospel with fifteen officers.

Living the Great Commission is more than traveling to a foreign country. It's about making disciples who glorify and obey Christ. Many of the lost people we met in Matucana reminded me of people from my hometown. They share the same questions about life, fears about death, and need to hear the Truth. As I reflected on my experience in Peru, I realized that if I can spend a summer going to a foreign country to build relationships and disciple people, I can surely spend time at home doing the same. A mission trip is not about adjusting to a new geographic location or foreign culture, it's about adjusting your heart to see hurting people as God sees them. It's about connecting with people in a compassionate and comforting way and offering them the hope only Jesus Christ can give. It's a heart adjustment we all need to make regardless of where we serve.

In my opinion, the TrinityQuest program deserves a sincere exploration and careful consideration by those wanting to change careers or wanting to learn to use the workplace as a platform to carryout the Great Commission. This program is ideal for those individuals sensing the call of God to become fully immersed in Christian ministry.

The alumni of Trinity College of Florida realize that we are part of one of the nation's premier Christian colleges and TrinityQuest is a specific program that provides a flexible and unique way for non-traditional students to finish their college education. Many have earned their degrees and graduated from the College through TrinityQuest. Those

FOSSIL COLLECTION ON DISPLAY

seeing it as a friend and not a foe," Dr. Woodward said. He told the guests the collection presents compelling evidence for the theory of intelligent design. "We are literally getting a chance to see a window on life as it was in the distant past," commented Dr. Woodward.

The fossil collection is a unique addition to the greater Tampa Bay area and features:

- A group of nuggets of fossilized tree sap with a variety of embedded insects
- Several specimens of the Guests explore the collection spectacular *Dicranurus monstrosus* species of trilobite
- A selection of extinct brachiopods found around Cincinnati, Ohio
- A rare skull of an extinct mammal from South Dakota, a Merycoidodon (also known as an Oreodon) with its teeth and jaw bones preserved in exquisite detail


CAMPUS ENHANCEMENTS


