Born in Englewood, Florida in 1954, Keith spent his childhood outdoors. The Gulf Coast of Florida is not lacking in offering endless imaginative journeys. His parents were hardworking people. His father was a fisherman and his mother shared a passion for the sea. His early years were, like most young children, formative. Beautiful scenery and breathtaking sunsets filled his mind and childhood with brilliant memories. Today, Keith is a celebrated artist who is proficient in watercolor, acrylics, and oils. With over 300 painting titles and nearly 120 published pieces of art into print, he has spent nearly 30 years building a reputation as one of Florida's preservationists of natural beauty and heritage through the visual arts. However, his passion for art is inferior to his passion for the Great Artist.

Overwhelmed by Faith Throughout his life. Keith searched for meaning and an understanding of the

world in which he found himself. As an artist and entrepreneur, he found early

success in the business world but struggled with an existential approach to finding meaning. As he cried out for meaning and strained for purpose, God began reaching out to Keith. It was during this spiritual journey that he came to faith in Christ. "Suddenly I realized there was a world within, not just a world around," remembers Keith. This profound spiritual awakening created an insatiable hunger 'within.'

After accepting Christ and while living in Clearwater, Florida, Keith had a hunger to read the Word of God and attend church. He found a church in Palm Harbor and began attending. The church's youth pastor began mentoring him. Keith spent hours studying and reading God's Word. As he continued to grow spiritually, so did his desire to grow in wisdom and knowledge. He heard of a local Christian college named Trinity through several students who were also attending the church and decided to explore the possibility of enrolling.

With little to no knowledge of the rigors of college life, Keith sat in the office of then President Barry Banther and asked if a student with little formal education could enroll. Dr. Banther developed a plan to admit Keith while helping him meet the requirements necessary to succeed. "Barry was very gracious to me. Someone who would stop me on campus, ask how I was doing and pray with me," recounts Keith. The challenges of balancing family life and employment while pursuing a college degree prevented Keith from finishing; however, this was not the final chapter of his time at Trinity College of Florida.

Overwhelmed by the Spirit Years passed and Keith continued growing in his faith and developing as

Years passed and Keith continued growing in his faith and developing as an artist. One day while living in Chiefland, Florida, he received an invitation to an outdoor art show venue in the Trinity area.

Being an inaugural event, Keith had a standing policy of waiting until an event had an established reputation before showing. The financial expense associated with attending an outdoor show was costly and inaugural events carried certain financial risks; however, Keith felt a

need to attend the Tarpon Springs show. He and his wife Linda packed up his pieces, loaded their trailer, and headed for the show. Once they arrived and began setting up their display, Keith felt within his spirit that God was telling him to reenroll at Trinity College of Florida. Later, he shared this burden with Linda who, unbenounced to him, felt the same strange message when she was setting up the art exhibit. The show was a relative success and Keith and Linda returned home. Through a series of divine events, God provided for Keith to return to Trinity College of Florida. Finally in 2001, Keith graduated with a degree in Biblical Studies. The journey had come full circle.

Today, Keith is an active member of his local church, Jasmine Lakes Baptist Church. His passion for missions has taken him on continental journeys to remote villages in Africa, India, China, Indonesia, Singapore, Thailand, Poland, Austria, Hungary, Slovakia, Italy, and South America. His travels have enhanced his understanding of God's great compassion and allowed him to find beauty and a deeper appreciation for his own cultural heritage.

Overwhelmed by Truth Even now, Keith's hunger for God, which began many years ago, is

Even now, Keith's hunger for God, which began many years ago, is evident as he sets aside three hours each day to study and digest the Word of God. In his "Think Tank" (as he likes to call his studio and office) Keith paints, writes poetry, develops course curriculum, and ponders the things of God. He is aggressively engaged in reading twenty different books simultaneously and has about half a dozen projects in the works revolving around art and the Christian worldview. Keith has a vision for connecting the Christian world with the arts. He dreams of touring nationally with works on the order of the Grand Masters accompanied by speakers lecturing on Christian theology and apologetics.

Psalm 19 and Romans I are Keith's favorite passages of Scripture. He sees in them a powerful understanding of the beauty and power of God. "Art can awaken the slumbering soul," touts Keith. It is the majesty and awe inspiring nature of God to express Himself through His creative and artistic attributes. Each painting Keith creates is given an intentional name and is accompanied by a story which takes the individual through


the medium of the visual picture, past the image, and straight to the heart of God.

It is almost as if it were yesterday, but somehow it seems a lifetime ago. Out there, it was as if time stood still. Lazily relaxing from all cares while considering the bigness of life, put one at ease. O the wonder of it all! Every morning the sun introduced the new day and every evening it bowed its head low and set its splendor arrayed colorfully across the heavens spreading its tablecloth of bounty on those below. Its multi-colored hues happily skipped across the top of waves and its flickered highlights mesmerized all who dare cast their gaze upon them. Gulf breezes blew against it but it stood almost as if invincible, even though a few lose boards flapped noisily while the salt spray dashed rhythmically against its pilings. Hot summer days rained heat upon the tin roof, burned bare feet, and weathered the already aging splintered wood.

Often in life, there are many adversaries that come against us; many woes that assail us. Yet, like the stilt home God has designed us and



For His Name & His Glory

 ${\cal J}$ could not believe my eyes. There in front of me was an advertisement of a scantily clad woman hanging next to a poster featuring an image of Jesus Christ. The Savior of the world was the very reason why I and my teammates were in Peru and here a picture of Christ was haphazardly hung beside a marketing poster designed to tantalize the eyes. It was in this local shop in the Majes River valley of southern Peru where I realized the native culture's lip service to Christ but lack of transformation. It was the polarizing nature of these images that would prove to define the culture of this community. There was an evident disconnect between the Holy God to which the Peruvians expressed their devotion and the heart expression of their culture. Even the native youth expressed an attachment to the Christian faith claiming, "The Bible and Jesus Christ are just a part of who we are. It is our culture." Yet, the transforming Truth of Christ had yet

to make a total change. It was a Peruvian

disconnect.

The culture and religion of Aplao, Peru and its surrounding towns were unique, even in comparison to other areas in the country. The most common question we were asked by the local people was, "How do you like our valley?" We learned quickly that they took pride in their valley and the history of it, often to the extent of idolizing it. This gave us an opportunity to express how beautiful their valley was; however, it also allowed us to remind them that its beauty paled in comparison to the majestic God who created it all. Evidence of the Catholic tradition was present throughout the land. Schools, hospitals, local businesses, and mountain shrines had images associated with the Christian faith. The extent to which this tradition was present in their culture was astonishing. The majority of the people readily embraced Catholic customs without ever knowing the God who was behind the artistic impressions. Many of the people could not connect their valley and tradition to the glorious God who created them to worship Him.

Beginning Fears

As we prepared for our twenty-one day mission trip to Aplao, Peru, our team spent many hours in prayer and fasting to ready our hearts. On the night we left from the College's campus, we sat down as a team to read several passages of Scripture and pray together to reflect on the purpose of our trip to Peru. Each passage we read centered on the same theme: Our Glorious King works "for the sake of His Name and His Glory."

Now in Peru, reflecting on that moment, the Lord worked in my heart. My gauge for success depended on how much the team could accomplish. As ministry opportunities developed in Peru, I took responsibility to keep the team focused and disciplined. My fear was we would lose passion. I did not want the end result of our trip to be a 'Peruvian vacation' accomplishing little for the Kingdom of God. Whether I said it with my lips or not, my heart had little trust in God's plan during those times of doubt. But through the course of the journey, I realized His Name and His Glory was the ultimate goal. Christ


humbled me and showed through amazing ways that He was working.


amazing Ways

Our team ministered the gospel at schools, the hospital, and in the plazas through Scripture, music, and drama. The days we spent ministering in the hospitals may have seemed unstructured in man's eyes but God arranged divine appointments which met. His plan for our trip. While visiting patients and ministering to nurses and doctors, we were able to extend the love of Christ. It was through these visits that God opened unique ministry opportunities.













Our team regularly had dinner together; we used this time to share our experiences throughout the day. After working with an impoverished family, we shared and reflected on the day's events. Not only did this family face economic hardship but also several members had been diagnosed with tuberculosis. The team was profoundly impacted by this family. As we discussed our service to this family, many of the team members were in tears. We struggled to express how we felt after ministering to the family. We certainly knew that God had ordained this opportunity and we longed to serve more families like this one. Words seemed inadequate to express the compassion we felt for families like those who faced such physical and financial obstacles. We later learned from a local believer that the family was progressing in their tuberculosis treatments. Our hearts were laid bare in regards to the injustice of our world expressed in this family.

The greatest evidence of God's hand moving in the valley was with the local believers. We met many of them in rather random ways, whether eating ice cream or in the plaza after an outreach event. What seemed random to us was God's divine appointment. Many of these local believers became part of our team and filled our hearts with joy as we saw their passion for God and a Christ-centered vision for the community. Their love for people and their Savior was the connection the valley desperately needed. Even now I cannot help but be filled with overwhelming joy when reflecting on these believers. From hospital visits to serving the poor to drama presentations, these episodes left me with no doubt that nothing on our trip caught God by surprise. He knew all that would happen and He ordained it to happen for the sake of His Name and His Glory.

Higher Truths

As the memories of our experience in the Majes River valley of southern Peru fade into the past, our hearts continually long to speak about the amazing work of our great God amongst the Peruvians. Words and pictures can never do justice to the actual experience we had in Peru. Our team realized that God, as He often does, was doing a work through us and in us. The Lord declares, "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways." The Lord's ways and thoughts are indescribable – no matter how badly we would love to fully understand them.

His Name and His Glory should be our passion. His plan is better. His ways are higher. His love is fuller. His joy is richer. While many in the Majes River valley are still left with a troubling disconnect, we know God is not finished. His transforming power is still working. He is moving even when we are not present. Christ changes culture because He changes lives. Even in our own lives, we struggle for control and discipline, thinking our ways are better and our plan is smarter. How foolish we are. Christ's redemptive work in Peru and in the lives of men and women all over the world is ongoing. Christ will make the ultimate connection for His Name and His Glory.

NEW PSYCHOLOGY PROGRAM ADDED



During its May 2010 meeting, the Trinity College of Florida Board of Trustees voted to approve the addition of a new psychology major. The new major will be available for students beginning in the 2010-2011 academic year. The psychology major will provide foundational preparation in psychological theory and practice from a Christian perspective. The major is designed for those who intend further

graduate study in psychology and those who wish to use psychology as a way of entering into various professions such as secondary education in the state of Florida, social work, human resources and related fields.

Students successfully completing the psychology program will demonstrate:

- I. A basic understanding of the major concepts, theoretical perspectives, empirical findings, and historical trends in psychology.
- 2. The ability to understand and apply basic research methods in psychology, including research design, data analysis, and interpretation.
- 3. The ability to weigh evidence, act ethically, and integrate Christian values with psychology as a discipline.

Dr. Elizabeth Earle-Warfel has been appointed as Assistant Professor of Psychology to provide academic support to the new program. Dr. Warfel completed her undergraduate work at the King's College in New York. She holds a Master of Divinity from Reformed Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Philosophy from Saybrook Graduate School and Research Center, a regionally accredited institution in San Francisco, CA.

We cannot avoid the middle of I Peter 4:13: "but rejoice to the extent that you partake of Christ's sufferings, that when His glory is revealed, you may also be glad with exceeding Joy."

In Central Africa the LRA rebels have kidnapped and slaughtered many of the children of national Christians. In February we visited and were asked by the people: "What did Jesus mean when He said, 'Don't be afraid?'" The believers in this war-torn area are "learning to count it all Joy." One of these who is learning the true meaning of Joy is Matthew Koumboki(1982). The truth he learned at Trinity College is helping him to encourage and comfort others who have faced these horrific challenges (two of Matthew's nephews were kidnapped by the LRA).

The majority of us have not suffered like others for the sake of Christ. We "R" the church and we should be labeled "Joys R Us." We must remember the example of our Lord Jesus of whom it is written: "For the Joy set before Him, endured the cross, scorning the shame, is set down at the right hand of the throne of God (Hebrews 12:2)." Jesus' followers who "go forth weeping, bearing precious seed" return with songs of Joy - carrying their sheaves with them (Psalm 126:6).

Trinity College continues to teach that a life of sacrifice produces successful, Joyful returns in spite of tears. Our success is not measured by the size of the church in which we attend or minister. Godly success is measured by our devotion to the Master.

Austin Philips (1974) writes in this summer's issue of *Heartland International Ministries* published by Fred Kornis (1976): "When we get back to being the church that was instead of attending the church that is, perhaps we shall once again see God do something for man rather than seeing what man can do for God." THE LAST WORD Rediscovering Goy

Joy always feels natural. It comes on easily but only under unusually wonderful circumstances. Like love, joy is something everyone wants but no one can hoard. It must be discovered but looking for it is useless. You don't find it. It finds you. You set the table and it comes for dinner; uninvited and welcome. There are many ways to prepare for joy. All of them have to do with noticing and appreciating the beauty, excitement, or pleasure in a past, present, or future experience.

In the Old Testament, the holidays and festivals were almost always accompanied by celebrations, feasting and reflection. Every year was punctuated by the reminders of God's blessing and provision. For instance, this is how God described The Feast of Booths in Deuteronomy 16:15; "For seven days you shall keep the feast to the LORD your God at the place that the LORD will choose, because the LORD your God will bless you in all your produce and in all the work of your hands, so that you will be altogether joyful."

Joy seems to come to all people sometimes but visits some people more often than others. Why? Because they tend to look for and celebrate the good in whatever they are involved. Celebration is both an expression of and an invitation to joy. The Psalms are filled with expressions of joy and gratitude for everything from who God is to what He does. In Psalm 84:2, the psalmist sings "My soul longs, yes, faints for the courts of the LORD; my heart and flesh sing for joy to the living God." It is hard to ponder those words for very long without coming dangerously close to the feeling of joy. Worship, whether alone or as part of a church, can and should teach and enable joyful gratitude to God. We can learn to notice beauty and goodness and appreciate the gifts of God and others even when we are suffering.

In the upper room shortly before his arrest, Jesus told his disciples, "As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full" (John 15:9-11). On the eve of his own crucifixion, Jesus spoke of His joy becoming ours. That joy obviously comes from adopting His perspective on suffering, as well as, joy. The beauty, power, and potential of God's plan for and relationship to His children is the backdrop that gives meaning to suffering and joy.

Rediscovering joy is very much a matter of reflecting on what we already have. Like happiness and humility, joy cannot be found as a goal unto itself. Joy is a byproduct of a thought life that is outward and upward focused. Joy is not only increased when it is spread to others; it spoils when it is hoarded. If this is true, then setting the table for joy involves inviting others to share in our joy by sharing with them what He has done and is doing. Let me make several suggestions for deepening your sense of joy in life.

- Use holidays and anniversaries to track the blessing of God and others. On your birthday reflect over previous birthdays and review past accomplishments and blessings. On your wedding anniversary take time to discuss previous anniversary celebrations and the important events of the year. Don't let time pass without noticing and reflecting on the larger purpose and patterns in it. I have kept a journal of all 41 of my wedding anniversaries, as well as, the important events of each year. It now takes up eight single spaced pages. Sharon and I review it sometime during each anniversary getaway. It never fails to bring joy.
- Write notes of appreciation to those who have given
 of themselves to you in some way recently. Be specific
 about what they did and why you appreciate it. In
 writing the note you will be reminding yourself that you
 are loved by God and others.
- In times of loss or disappointment, try to see the larger context. You don't have to see the loss as good; just don't see it as the final summary of your life. While grieving it may take months and even years to realize, but it is a journey to healing.

God's joy is just as much a part of Him as His love and holiness; it comes to us in our relationship to Him.
