



A CHANGED LIFE,

a Foundation to Build On

When asked the key to impacting the world, Herman Bailey leans forward and with crystal clarity says, "Recognize the Lord has put you in this place and it has nothing to do with you; it's all about Him." The life story of Herman and Sharron Bailey is breathtaking. Theirs is a story rich in faith, anchored in prayer, and inspiring to millions.

Troubled Beginnings

Born in rural Kentucky. Herman Bailey experienced a challenging childhood. His parents left him and his older sister in the care of a cousin as they traveled to Chicago. Illinois in hopes of making a better life for their young children. Young Herman was faced with feelings of abandonment; wondering why he only saw his parents once a year. His care-taker relative assumed many of the parenting responsibilities including the children's religious up-bringing. The Bailey children were raised in the church and frequently participated in fellowship picnics where Herman would pray on command when pinched by his overzealous guardian.

As time went by, the Bailey children were reunited with their parents and moved to Illinois. The move triggered a confusing time for Herman which led to deep anger, resentment, and suicidal thoughts. "I became involved in gangs and was a very rebellious young man," recounts Herman. Frustrated with his son's attitude and behavior, Herman's father sent him to a series of private schools in the hopes they could straighten him out. The strategy failed as each new school adventure ended the same way: Herman being asked to leave.

Flo Ernst, a family friend of the Baileys and a professor at Trinity College, suggested Herman attend the college in Florida. Herman's father decided to put the plan into action. "One day my father asked me, 'Son, how would you like to go to college in Florida?" I thought to myself, Florida – why not." remembers Herman.

Back in the 1950's, Trinity College of Florida was located in the Old Belleview Club in Clearwater. "I really wasn't into the atmosphere on campus. I was not at all in the mode of being one of those spiritual guys, but I knew what to say and how to act so I wouldn't stand out," recounts Herman. He tells of a week when one fellow female student walked up to him on campus and said to him, "You're not saved." "That's just the way it was back then," remembers Sharron Bailey, "very direct."

a Changed Life

Later in the week. Herman was attending chapel and heard T.W. Wilson preach. "I was sitting mid-way back near the aisle. I remember T.W. Wilson giving an invitation at the end of his sermon and wondering, "Why would he do that at a Christian college?" It was as if he was speaking directly to me. I could feel my heart pounding in my chest and I went forward to accept Christ as my Savior." It was in the chapel on the campus of Trinity College where Herman Bailey experienced the life defining moment which would forever shape his future.

After meeting Sharron Yoder, a fellow classmate, Herman proposed and the two were married on May 15, 1959 and moved to Buffalo, New York. They spent thirteen years in Buffalo and later moved to Chicago before deciding to relocate to Clearwater, Florida, Upon arriving in Florida,

Herman and Sharron connected with Rev. Bill Kline (class of 1964), a friend from their college days and Senior Pastor of Trinity Baptist Church. Herman and Sharron became actively involved in the church's ministry and outreach, while Herman tried his hand at several jobs attempting to establish himself in the area.



One night the Baileys received a call

at I pm from Bill Kline asking to meet with Herman the next morning. The following day Herman arrived at Bill's office where Bill asked him if he would be interested in starting a seniors' ministry at the church. Herman's response was "Are you kidding me? I don't speak. I don't sing. If I stand up and speak, my face shakes. Why would you ask me?" Herman left the meeting and wrestled with Bill's proposition for three months. Finally, he met again with Bill and immediately refused the invitation. Bill picked up his Bible, pointed it at Herman, and said, "Show me that God can't use you." Confronted with his fear, Herman relented and accepted the challenge.

Herman went about putting together how the seniors' ministry would operate. He and Bill decided on the name Super Sixties. The program

would hold weekly meetings, group trips and outings, and would be an outreach ministry for the church. Following weeks of publicity, the first *Super Sixties* meeting took place with 150 in attendance on a Friday morning. In time, the weekly gatherings grew. "At the time I read an article which stated only I out of 500,000 adults over the age of 65 accepted Christ. I prayed to the Lord; if it be His will, I would like to change that statistic," said Herman. And change is what happened.

Over time Super Sixties grew to be the world's largest senior adult ministry. Over

1,500 senior adults would attend each week. The church facility was unable to hold the growing numbers of seniors who came to be part of the Bailey's ministry. Over a four year period Herman had the distinct honor of helping lead over 3,400 seniors to faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Herman's expertise was sought out and he began holding national seminars on how to start aggressive seniors' ministries in churches all over the United States. While Super Sixties was at the height of its popularity, God began to prepare Herman and Sharron for the next season of ministry in their lives.


Lights, Camera, Action Sixties

Bob D'Andrea, a local television personality, was attempting to raise funds to launch a Christian television network in the area. He attended one of the *Super Sixties* meetings and shared his vision with Herman about starting a television program geared for senior adults. Herman agreed to help Bob search for the on-air talent. One day over lunch Bob told Herman he had found his host. Herman, eager to know, wanted to meet the individual Bob had selected. Herman recalls, "At that moment Bob said, 'I'm looking at him!'" Again Herman found himself at the crux of a difficult decision: Stay in the comfortable, successful seniors' ministry or

start all over again. The choice was not easy; but after prayer and reflection, Herman and Sharron decided to enter into the uncharted world of Christian television.

On November 3, 1980, Herman Bailey began *Action Sixties*, the nation's first, live, full-hour show dedicated to senior adults. *Action Sixties* later changed its name to *It's Time for Herman and Sharron*, as Sharron joined Herman as on-air co-host. The Friday format of the show is known as *Coffee Club Live* and is sent into over 15 million homes on WCLF-TV. Herman and Sharron have been awarded ten Angel Awards which recognize individuals in the media for works of high moral, spiritual and social impact have met and interviewed individuals such as former President George H. W. Bush, Ravi Zacharias, and Franklin Graham. While the show's format has changed over the years, their influence continues to touch the lives of millions of individuals throughout the world.

Yet, with all his success. Herman still remembers the impact his college days in Florida had on his life and ministry. "Trinity College is the foundation I have built on. When I sit down and start to study the Word or when I am introduced around the world, the thing that comes to my mind is Trinity College. Trinity College has always been the foundation and the beginning of everything that has happened in my life." The foundation laid at Trinity College was instrumental in beginning the world's largest senior adult ministry, the nation's first senior adult television program and, as a result, has impacted millions of lives all over the world. Herman remembers, "The Lord takes you from the most amazing places. It has been a walk that is all summed up in one word – miracle." And what a miracle it has been.

Perry Talent, a student at Trinity College, was visiting a friend at Marrable Hill Chapel in Arkansas when he decided to leave a catalogue with the church's high school boys' Sunday school teacher in the event he would know of any young men who would be interested in attending the College. The Sunday school teacher knew Charlie Martin felt a call into full-time ministry and decided to pass on the information. That afternoon the high school junior took the book home and after Sunday lunch went into his room, closed the door, and read through the entire catalogue. "I read it, front to back, and told my parents I liked everything about the College and wanted to know more and see this place," recounts Charlie. It was that Arkansas Sunday afternoon when a spark entered Charlie Martin's mind about attending the College which would train and equip him for a lifetime of ministry.

The Gowrney Begins The Martins decided to take the family's first out of state vacation that

The Martins decided to take the family's first out of state vacation that summer to Florida so Charlie could see the campus of Trinity College and decide if it would be the place God would have him attend. Trinity College seemed like a good fit for Charlie. He wanted a college where he could study the Word of God. Growing up in El Dorado, Arkansas, Charlie felt a call into fulltime Christian ministry by the age of 11. During a missionary slide show, he experienced a call into the Gospel ministry; now as he approached the decision as to where he would study, Trinity College seemed like the perfect fit. "Not only did I want to get to know the word of God, but I also had a deep admiration for Billy Graham and felt his attendance at the College was a good stamp of approval," remembers Charlie. After a personal tour by the President and Founder, Dr. Watson, he knew Trinity was the college for him.

Charlie's first semester was not easy. He was not a straight 'A' student and after six months he was placed on academic probation. "That's when I got serious about my grades," states Charlie. Classes were rigorous and the professors set high standards. Charlie wondered if he would ever understand Dr. Bragg, the theology professor, whom he later

grew to know and admire. "When you went through Systematic Theology with Dr. E. C. Bragg, you came out on the other side and you knew what you believed and why you believed what you believed."

Academic studies were not the sole focus at Trinity College; students were also encouraged to seek out ministry application. Charlie was afforded numerous opportunities to serve. He led music at several churches, including a two-year part-time position as the Music and Youth Director at First Baptist Church of Tarpon Springs, Florida. Charlie was involved in street witnessing in Ybor City and Tampa; he would preach anywhere he was given the opportunity. Charlie remembers that he and fellow student, Willey McBride, would drive to Hispanic communities in a flat bed truck and preach from the truck bed. "Willey would translate into Spanish as I preached."

Charlie's time at Trinity College was formative. He worked part-time jobs while he studied and wrote papers, putting himself through College. "I never thought of myself as a very intelligent man, but I claimed Acts 4:13 which says, 'Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were uneducated and untrained men, they marveled. And they realized that they had been with Jesus.' I realized if God could use Peter and John he might be able to use me." God was ready to use Charlie Martin.

Back to Arkansas

Upon graduating from Trinity College in 1967, Charlie returned to El Dorado, Arkansas, where he became the youth minister at Marrable Hill Chapel; this was the same church where he accepted Christ, was baptized, and called into full-time ministry. He had planned to attend seminary and was taking steps towards enrolling but things changed.

"The youth ministry at the church exploded! Suddenly this small church had 80-100 youth in attendance. I kept putting off attending seminary because the work was so great," recalls Charlie. After three and one half years at Marrable Hill Chapel, Charlie felt it was time to move to a new phase of ministry. He became involved in revival circuits and evangelism meetings. It was during one evangelistic meeting at Emmanuel Baptist Church in Pine Bluff, Arkansas that Charlie came into contact with the music director of a small Baptist church in Florida. The music director took a liking to Charlie and arranged for him to preach a revival series at his church.

an Impact at Indian Rocks

After finishing a fantastic week of revival meetings in Florida, Charlie received a phone call from the senior pastor of Indian Rocks Baptist Church inquiring of his interest to become the church's associate pastor for youth and music. Charlie, believing this invitation was from the Lord, accepted and on April 14, 1971 was brought on staff. After ten months, the senior pastor left and Charlie Martin became the senior pastor of First Baptist Church of Indian Rocks in May 1972.

On Charlie's first Sunday as senior pastor, the church had 79 people in Sunday school and 91 in the Worship Service. Charlie set about looking for ways to grow the church and spread the Gospel. "Almost immediately all around the area orange groves and wooded areas were being cleared for new communities. Homes were popping up all around us. I thought to myself, 'people will not have to drive all the way to Tampa for church; the church will be right here waiting for them," remembers Charlie.

As the community grew, so did Indian Rocks. Capital campaigns and building programs followed as the small church grew in size and influence. In the fall of 1984 Indian Rocks Christian School was founded and has graduated over 530 students. In January 1988 the church had to relocate as the current property was landlocked. As the facilities grew, so did the ministries. The new ministries included: The Solid Rock Company, a high school ministry which has seen over 14,000 students accept Christ, the Memorial Ministry and Memorial Gardens, the establishment of a Medical Clinic to serve the needs of the congregation and community, and The Heron House, an assisted living facility dedicated to meeting the needs of senior adults and their families. Most recently, the church celebrated its 50th Anniversary in its new state-of-

the-art Worship Center which seats over 3,200. Today the church membership has grown to over 6,000 with an average attendance of 3,000 each weekend.

Worth It

Yet for all the change, growth, and expansion which has occurred under Charlie Martin's leadership, he still lives by the motto: The main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing. "It's all about Jesus and the change He makes in peoples' lives," touts Charlie. When asked about making a

difference in the world. Charlie states, "It's not about being a perfect person. Put your trust in the Lord; there you have access to the deepest resources. It's putting our confidence and trust in Him." When reflecting on his time at Trinity College and thinking of young men and women who are seeking God's direction in their lives, Charlie reiterates, "One year of Bible College is a great experience for anybody, especially when you don't know what you are going to do with your life. One year of your life dedicated to being grounded in God's Word and waiting upon the Lord to see what He would want you to do with your life is not much to give." By looking at Charlie Martin's life, his commitment to the study of God Word's was an investment worth making.

A CHANGED LIFE, A Dream to Realize

 $\mathcal{W}_{ ext{ith}}$ her mother at the grocery store and her brother playing video games, Rebekah went into the kitchen, took a knife, and went into the bathroom. It was a crisis moment for her. Believing no one truly cared or would miss her, Rebekah prepared to take her own life. She felt suicide would be an escape; a way to avoid the emotional pain which plagued her. As she contemplated the act she was about to commit, she cried out to God, praying, "God I don't

really want to do this. There has to be more to life than this. And I know God, You have to be able to save me from this but I just can't see it right now." At that moment a knock at the door from her younger brother, demanding access to the bathroom, was the sudden intervention that brought Rebekah to her senses. She threw the knife under the sink and headed to her room. That night for the first time in her life, Rebekah read God's Word. It was the beginning of a journey which would lead her to a personal relationship with Christ.



Growing up for Rebekah was not an easy experience. Bouts with depression, low self-esteem, eating disorders, cutting, and a suicide attempt plagued the life of this young girl from Tennessee. Yet, in the midst of her trouble and pain, Rebekah found the soothing grace of Christ and became a life changed from the inside out. Later, on a week long mission trip to Grenada, Rebekah was amazed at the genuine faith of

the Christians she met. "The peopl<mark>e were so grateful for everything we</mark> did for them. When we had praise and worship, the people were really praising God. They were praising God with everything they had. It really woke me up."

The mission trip to Grenada planted a seed in Rebekah's heart which eventually led her to enroll at Trinity College of Florida. "As soon as I set foot on the Trinity campus, I knew this was where I was supposed to be," declared Rebekah. "I always felt drawn to Trinity College of Florida." While at Trinity, Rebekah tells how her focus changed from herself to influencing others for Christ. "You can find people who really." know you and can relate to you. Trinity is unique because the people are here because they want to be here and they are seeking after God."



THE LAST WORD How Can J Change The World?

ne night a wife found her husband standing over their newborn's crib. As she watched him looking down at their very first baby, she saw on his face a mixture of emotions: disbelief, doubt, delight, amazement, enchantment and skepticism. Touched by this unusual display and the deep emotions it aroused, with eyes glistening, she slipped her arm around her husband and said, "A penny for your thoughts, dear." "It's amazing," he replied. "What's amazing?" she inquired, knowing he was deep in thought about what he was seeing. "I just can't see how they can make a crib like that for only \$109.95."

Here lay one of the greatest miracles in God's creation, and all the father saw was the crib. He didn't see what lay within; he missed the point. Isn't that what Jesus was trying to get us to do? He said, "Look unto the fields that are white unto harvest... The harvest is truly plentiful, but the laborers are few" Matthew 9:37. The question becomes: How can I avoid missing the point and really **change the world?**

Gi Purpose

The first chapter of Acts tells me I can **change the world** and impact it for an eternal difference. First, God has a purpose that insults my flesh. We live in an American culture which has coined the slogans: You deserve a break today, Have it your way, We did it for you, Be all you can be, and Quench your thirst. We live in an egocentric, narcissistic world that teaches us we're #1: satisfy yourself, pamper yourself, make sure you take care of #1. Our culture says, "Get all you can, can all you get, sit on the lid, and poison the rest."

Our theology becomes *me-ology*. Listen to our prayer requests; the songs we sing, even in church. Do they sound as

if our focus is on God or is it subtly my feeling, my fears, my world, to the point I become the focus. When was the last time you prayed for the Hui people of China, or the Idaca people of Benin, or the Dongnu people of China, or the Mons people of Myanmar, or the Bambara people of West Africa?

The Book of Acts is not about the Holy Spirit and power

in you; it's about God's power through you. It's not about you.

It's about God's power to be a witness to others starting at home and carrying on into the uttermost part of the world.

Gi Plan

The second truth: God has a plan that includes me. Luke said in Acts I:8, "You shall be my witnesses after the Holy Spirit comes upon you." Question: When did the Holy Spirit come upon you? Answer: The moment you received Jesus Christ. This means His presence produces a power that gives you not only a purpose but also a plan.

In God's wisdom and sovereignty, He did not leave us alone but gave us a comforter, a paraclete, a power within for the purpose of being a witness which begins the moment we are saved. It is a power that produces change, When you look at the day of Pentecost, you'll see the change in Simon Peter. Before thousands, he puts his finger in their face and says, "You crucified Jesus." Before Pentecost, he hides his face over a young girl who recognizes him. What made the difference? God's Power.


John, one of Jesus' twelve, was one of two brothers called *Sons of Thunder*. One day he said, "Lord, should we call down fire from heaven?" After God's Spirit came down, he was called the *beloved disciple*. What made the difference? God's Power.

Gi Place

Here is the third principle: God has a place that involves your future. Acts 1:8 says we shall be witnesses, and He tells us where. Jerusalem, our community; Judea, our country; Samaria, our continent; and the uttermost, our world. God has a plan. He has given us a purpose. He has provided us power, and He has charted a place to make a difference and **change our world**. His purpose insults our flesh. His plan involves our faith. His place invites our future.

You can be a witness. It may very well be as a teacher, architect, engineer, waiter or waitress, coach, lawyer, doctor, homemaker, or it may be over "there". You may be a missionary apprentice, a career missionary, a journeyman, or even in some denominational circles they allow you to make a commitment even when you're 50 years or older called a Master's Program.

You can **change the world** and God can use you to be a change agent with the Gospel in people's lives. Let's heed our Lord's call: "Look unto the fields that are white unto harvest." See the world with eyes of mercy where truth and righteousness meet with eyes of simplicity. Here our life is lived simply, naturally, and with sincerity. See this world through eyes of integrity where we live and speak honesty and live uprightly. Lastly, see this world through eyes of reality where we speak the cultural language of our day, and maybe, just maybe, God will invite you to **change the world** one person at a time.
