The tallest trees on earth are the sequoia sempervirens or more commonly known as redwood trees. These remarkable trees are located in northern and central California. Redwoods can reach over 350 feet high, towering over surrounding foliage and animal life. A single redwood can live for 2,000 years and weigh over 500 tons. The impressive magnitude of these specimens is difficult to comprehend. Tall and proud these sentinels of the west coast evoke awe and wonder as they thrust through the air, reaching incredible natural heights.

Yet, as remarkable as the redwood is, the root system is shockingly shallow. Redwoods have no tap root and their other roots may be no deeper than six to twelve feet. So how is it possible that this natural marvel achieves such outstanding heights with a comparatively superficial foundation? The secret is not in the depth of the roots but in the redwoods intermingling root systems.

Redwoods achieve remarkable feats of altitude because they structurally depend on each other for support. The major roots of redwoods are about one inch in diameter and typically spread 50 to 80 feet. As they grow each redwood's roots intertwine with the adjacent trees. The networking of roots allows for a solid foundation that allows the safety and infrastructure required to soar into the sky. Simply put: together they are stronger.

Trinity College of Florida is a family and this year that family is celebrating 80 years of global impact. Like the mighty redwoods, families are able to

achieve, become and dream more when they are together. Individual redwoods like individual family members may be able to reach certain levels of success by themselves, but when adversity knocks, the family which is together is stronger.

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
AN UNFLINCHING

Balanced Learning & Doing

Trinity College inspires formative disciplines to be developed. Evolving from the Bible Institute and Bible College movements of the past century, Trinity still emphasizes Christian living while students study. Trinity training means more than the mere academic stuffing of information into categorical pockets of our brain. The practical side deals with what to do with what we know. Fact is not superior to faith. Knowing is not superior to doing. What we know is not elevated above what we are. We build our lives while we study to sharpen our minds and develop our skills. The disciplines of study are matched with growth in relationships.

As friends we sat sipping our coffee and talking about a popular seminar that came annually to our town. One couple asked another, "Are you signed up to attend again this year? Got your registration in?" I felt embarrassed as I had not registered. Then, the second husband replied, "No, we have not registered 'cause we're not going. We've decided to stay home this year and do what we were taught last year." He had the right idea. It is a sorrowful fact that most of us know better than we do. Our words are right while our practice lags behind. We struggle against the hypocrisy resulting between words and action.

All education struggles to move from hearing to doing. It's oft-said, teaching is more than telling and learning is more than listening. What is vital is not just to pass the course, but to begin living; putting into actual practice our Maker's instructions. In many ways, it is true that you never truly know a truth until you've taught it to others. Pass truth on to those who follow until the taught become the teachers.

Trinity College thrives on Biblical truth because scripture becomes the guide

to life at every step and in every facet of life. We discipline ourselves to follow Christ by walking in















conformity to the Word of God. Saints find favor with God and with man when they discover the Owner's Manual and tailor their life by its message.

Growth in a Community of Faith

Trinity history confirms that teacher and student interaction are dynamic influences in our development. Those who teach us and lead us are models of righteous and godly living. We learn to know our Bible but also to live by its instruction. The informal learning by example, participation and first-hand observation are possible at a college setting like Trinity College. Together it produces fruitfulness in a living-the-theory model. This deepens each lesson and strengthens our lives.

When we have moved on and no longer have the day-to-day contact with Trinity, most will carry visual images of friends, mentors and peers for whom our esteem and respect will never dim. We will cherish the memories and lessfrequent distant-contacts. This is more than a bonus benefit; it is a vital part of our educational experience to be fostered and affirmed at every opportunity the Lord allows for us.

In my personal contacts with Dr. Billy Graham, perhaps one of Trinity's best loved alumnus, I have heard him repeatedly state his recall of the passionate, fervent plea of godly professors he had while a student here, urging students to "win the lost, rescue the perishing, snatch them in pity from sin and the grave. To weep 'or the erring one, lift up the fallen and tell them of Jesus, the mighty to save". These were words spoken with tears streaming down the professor's face.

Such vision and urgency is better caught than taught. But what does godly living look like? The world cannot define it because spiritual things are spiritually discerned. Observing closely those of godly character will imprint the fruit of the Spirit in lessons that words could never convey. Eighty years of Trinity College history has taught that lesson to thousands in our communities.

Reflecting His Glory

The power of prayer and the prayer of faith are very much part of the Trinity experience. When every way seemed closed and critical needs developed, we learned to seek the Lord and to depend upon Him. For a lifetime, we build our priority and participation in earnest, consistent prayer.

The Lord provides for and supplies our every need. Many have confirmed that truth in a unique way. Some found basic essentials-of-life as they worked, studied, prayed and struggled. And then, out of seemingly no-where, God sends us His provision. Faith in God, not self-reliant efforts, is the source of our satisfaction.

Yes, it's true: You can't do anything greater than to pray. But, after you've prayed, you can definitely do more! History reveals that the Trinity College community is a praying family. We know that from our story. Since little prayer means little power but much prayer means much power as we raise our voices in earnest, fervent prayer.

Like the rain on the righteous and the unrighteous, tensions, problems, troubles distractions, irritations and distressing circumstances will come. Our





trust and hope is in our Heavenly Father who waits for His children to come to the throne of grace to obtain mercy and to find help in the time of need.

Over and over again for the past eighty years, we have come to crossroads where all we could do was pray. God has answered prayer in dramatic fashion and in simple ways that affirm our trust and encourage our faith. Little-by-little and step-by-step, our dependence on the Vine to allow His life to flow thru the Branches lifts our courage to ask in the victorious Name above all names, the Name of Jesus. No crisis, whether of finances, leadership, conflict or worldchaos has been able to side-track us. We know that "He is able" and we keep on singing as we go!

Seasons of Decision

Every day we reach intersections of decision where we choose between two alternatives. Even the choice of education is a major formative decision which then helps fashion most other subsequent choices. Choosing Trinity College is of paramount influence since one makes life-impacting decisions during college days.



New capabilities and fresh perspectives result from the student's training and opens new possibilities of exploration and opportunity. Broader horizons open in the Christian worldview which is being formed during these early years. After initial choices, other steps follow in a domino effect. Each disciple will face open doors and limitations in their personal life and world.

Eighty years of Trinity history instructs us to value the mature growing discernment as learn-by-experience, "having our facilities trained by experience to distinguish good and evil" (Hebrews 6:12). Of paramount importance is to be open to hear God's calling for service. We use what we have of gifts and abilities, talents and opportunities, to discover our place. We recognize fully that we can all serve God in vocational witness and service.

The call of reaching a perishing world, the soon return of our Savior, the value of a never-dying soul, the unfathomable love of Christ and the terror of a Christ-less

eternity have become the motivations to be all that we can be for Christ Jesus our Lord. This has been the eighty year unflinching passion Trinity College of Florida.



Then my father used a wheelchair to roll my grandfather, Dr. W.T. Watson, into the 1981 spring Trinity College Alumni Banquet, the crowd stood and applauded heartfelt appreciation.

this point in history, Dr. Watson was the only president the school had ever known but due to health issues, the students and faculty had only seen him a few times during the year. A weak heart had kept him away from the daily operation of the college for much of the academic year.

I did not know until years later that my grandmother was adopted. She never spoke of it until just a few years before her death. She was born deep in the

Appalachian Mountains near Sylva, NC. My great-grandfather Roberts met her as a young child while buying dogwood for his shuttles. Someday I hope I can learn more about the tragic early years of my grandmother's life, but I am proud I was able to know the Godly Quaker couple who took her in as a child, made her a part of their family and helped shape the Christ-like woman she became.

My grandparents met while attending Toccoa Falls Bible Institute in the early 1920's. Shortly before she passed away, Nanny told me about the time the school founder and president, Dr. R. A. Forrest called her into his office when he heard she was engaged to marry Bill Watson. He attempted to discourage the marriage and suggested she should make a visit to his home in the sand hills of North Carolina near Lumberton so she could see "where he came from" before saying "I do". She didn't need to make a visit, because

she loved the young preacher and believed in him. She became his life-long companion and strongest supporter.

After graduating from Toccoa Falls and before getting married, Dr. Watson

headed north to attend Nyack Missionary College in the beautiful Hudson River Valley north of New York City. When I was ten years old, Papo and Nanny took

me to Canada. As we crossed the George Washington Bridge into New York he pointed north in the direction of the college and remarked about going to school at Nyack and what a beautiful place it was.

It was there he met John Minder, a tall lanky fellow Southerner, who became his life-long friend. They had no way of knowing when they were preaching together on the streets of New York City as young students that they both would later mentor one of the greatest evangelists of the 20th century, Billy Graham.

MOBILE MINISTRY IN 1962

It was during a 1962 summer trip with my grandparents, that I was introduced to two of the great campgrounds of New England and Canada. In Old Orchard Beach, Maine we stopped at the old Methodist campground located on the north edge of the popular Atlantic Coast resort. For well over fifty years the campground had been home to summer Chautauquas and camp meetings.

Dr. Watson was a regular speaker almost every summer during the 1930s and 1940s and he used the opportunity to promote the new Bible Institute he founded in Florida in 1932. My Dad has several personal letters between my grandfather and Billy Graham from 1940 until the early 1950's. In some of the early correspondence they wrote about the summer meetings in Old Orchard Beach and how Rev. Graham planned to join Dr. Watson in one of the meetings. In subsequent letters, however, the young evangelist explained

Many remember Dr. Watson as a hefty, robust man who, despite bad knees, could easily keep up with his much younger students. During his later years he used a cane to help him walk, but most had never seen him in the wheelchair he was using that evening. When he took the platform he looked weak and pale and had lost a lot of weight. Most had never seen him without a tie but on this evening his frail neck could not support one.

When he stood to the pulpit he gripped it firmly with his left hand so his right arm could be free to help him preach. Dr. Watson was an animated preacher. His sermons were marked with broad gestures and the clapping of his hands to make emphasis. He would often point while preaching but would always admonish young preachers to "...never use the index finger without using the thumb!" He would then make a gesture pointing to the congregation with his index finger and back to himself with his thumb.

After a slight pause he addressed the Trinity family. "I've been president of Trinity College for a long time. So long, in fact, I can tell exactly what you're thinking. You're thinking 'He don't look like he used to!' Well I've got news for you – YOU DON'T EITHER!" The uncertainty and apprehension that had filled the banquet hall turned into relief and laughter. Dr. Watson's body was starting to fail him, but his mind, spirit and wit were as strong as ever.

PAPO & NANNY

Almost everyone addressed my grandfather and grandmother simply as Dr. and Mrs. Watson; a few close friends called them Bill and Lucy, but my brother, sister and I always knew them as Papo and Nanny.

William Thomas Watson was born in a small tenant house near the tobacco fields of eastern North Carolina on May 21, 1901. He was born premature and weighed less than two pounds. He told folks he was so small they had to put him on a pillow to make sure he was still there. He often related this story in his sermons: "When my mother thought I wasn't going to make it, she took a spoon with honey and touched it to my lips. I opened my mouth and started wagging my tongue and I've been wagging my tongue ever since!"

I never heard my grandfather talk much about his father, but he often spoke of his Godly mother. I never knew her but my father often told me about getting tobacco juice on his cheek when his grandmother Watson, who regularly dipped snuff, would give him a kiss. Dr. Watson's younger sister Cora came along soon after and the small family of four eked out a modest existence as sharecroppers in the Carolina sand hills.

My grandmother grew up in an upper middleclass family in Greensboro, NC. Her father was a businessman from Michigan who relocated to the South in the late 19th century to open a factory supplying dogwood shuttles to textile mills. Great-grandmother was a petite woman who taught art on the college level before getting married. I remember making several visits to the home of my great-grandparents Roberts. They lived in a charming, arts and craft style home in Greensboro. Mrs. Watson's parents were devout Quakers who often spoke using 'thee' and 'thou'.

to my grandfather that his busy schedule would prohibit him from attending.

Our road trip adventure continued when we headed north toward Canada. We made the long trip in my grandmother's 1961 Rambler Classic. Papo did most of

the driving and while he was a great preacher and a dynamic orator, he was a terrible driver. Riding with him was somewhat akin to riding a rollercoaster sometimes fast and sometimes slow, always jerky and many times a little scary. The few times Nanny drove she resembled a typical St. Petersburg senior lady driver who looks through the steering wheel rather than over it.

A CANADIAN STOP & CONNECTION

In Hartland, New Brunswick, Canada he held a revival that summer involving a few of the many Canadians who had become an important part of Trinity College. From the time Dr. Watson founded Florida Bible Institute in 1932, Canadians were a part of the school. Winter Bible conferences were always synonymous with Trinity College and they attracted "snowbirds" from throughout the North and Canada who in turn became financial supporters of the school.

I remember the campground in Hartland on the banks of the St. John River being very primitive. With the exception of the dining hall and assembly room, there was no electricity or running water. My grandparents stayed in a small one room cottage where they used a bowl and pitcher to bathe and an oil lamp for light. I stayed in the back part of the canteen near the dining hall and slept on a small cot surround by canned goods and kitchen supplies. Hartland is home to the longest covered bridge in the world and if you visit the small town today, it is still very much as it was fifty years ago.

The crowds were not huge, but the assembly hall was comfortably filled each evening and the response of the local people was enthusiastic. Many will remember the Musical Mac Murrays who were often at Trinity College during the 1960s and 1970s. Mac led the music that summer and was a colorful trumpet player who along with his wife Lavada traveled the country leading music for revivals. My grandfather was always impressed with the showman and used

The musical part of the service was dynamic and exciting. Papo would often join Mac in leading the congregation in singing All Hail the Power of Jesus Name, Since Jesus Came into My Heart, Ring the Bells of Heaven and other great hymns. While Dr. Watson was not the greatest singer and was sometimes not exactly on pitch, he was without a doubt the best song leader I have ever known. When he led the congregation in a hymn, everyone sang. His enthusiasm was infectious.

A PASSIONATE PREACHER

When Dr. Watson stood to preach, he took command of the room. His sermons were simple, profound and memorable. He often centered his remarks around a biblical phrase from his text. "Is the seed yet in the barn", "Where there is no wood, the fire goeth out", "Come and see", "Alas master, for it is borrowed" were all familiar sermons to anyone who was under his ministry for any length of time.

After our visit to Canada and New England during the summer of 1962, we made a stop in Lumberton, NC to visit Aunt Cora, Papo's younger sister. She operated a small cafe in town and lived just a few miles from the tobacco fields where she and my grandfather grew up. Many will remember Cora who faithfully manned the switchboard at the Trinity College Fenway campus during the 1960s and early 1970s.



My most precious memory of my grandfather was at the graveside of his sister. Before we left the graveside, he talked to Cora as if she were there, expressing how much she meant to him through years and how much he loved her. He then laid his hand or her casket and said, "Goodnight Cora. I'll see you in the morning". With that we quietly walked away.

A FARMER & FAMILY MAN

My grandfather learned to love Northeast Georgia during his Toccoa Falls days and regularly visited his alma mater after graduating. In 1936 Dr. Watson purchased an old, apple orchard

near the Northeast Georgia mountain town of Demorest. I'll always believe he bought the farm as a way to stay connected to his farming youth.

Someone once said "you can take the boy from the farm, but you'll never take the farm from the boy." That was certainly the case for Dr. Watson. Almost every time I visited my grandparents in their small, neatly kept home in St. Petersburg, I would find a current copy of Progressive Farmer next to my grandfather's chair. Stories about plowing in the field and slopping the hogs almost always found a way into his sermons.

The only person who loved "the farm" more than my grandfather was my dad. Robert Watson was their only child and six years old when he first visited Northeast Georgia. He remembers to this day the first time he saw the place he would someday make his home. In Florida Dr. Watson's time was often consumed by the college and church, but when they were on the farm my grandfather and dad were father and son.

THREE FRIENDS

During my years as a student at Trinity I often drove my grandfather to meet many of the VIP's arriving to speak at the college. I'll never forget the time Papo and I met Col. Sanders at the airport. Yep, he and I took the famed Kentucky Fried Chicken (KFC) founder to lunch and no, he didn't order chicken! I was most honored to drive Dr. Robert G. Lee, the great pulpit orator, during his many visits to Trinity College. My heart is filled with many warm memories of my grandfather.

One of Dr. Watson's greatest sermons was from I Corinthians 13 on faith, hope and love. Indeed, faith, hope and love are the best words to describe the life of W.T. Watson. At the close of the sermon he talked about standing at the gates of Heaven with his life-long companions, Faith, Hope, and Love.

He looked to Faith and said, "Faith, you have been a good friend. I used you every day. It was you who helped me accomplish things I never dreamt possible. But I need to tell you goodbye now, because I won't need you any longer." Then he looked to Hope. "Hope, you were also a wonderful friend. It was you that lifted me up when I was down and gave me strength when I was weak. But Hope it is time for me to say goodbye, because I won't need you anymore." Then he looked to Love and said, "Love thank you for introducing me to Faith and Hope. Together we made it to these Pearly Gates. Now take my hand Love as we step together into Heaven."

When Dr. Watson waved to the Trinity family assembled at the graduation banquet in 1981 it was his last public appearance. He went to be with the Lord on June 5, 1981.

I love you, Papo. You were a great inspiration to us all. May we all follow your example of a life filled with faith, hope and love, until that Blessed Day when we meet on the other side, when our morning comes.

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A LIFE-CHANGING by Peggy Bragg

On September 20, 1932 a small Bible college, Florida Fundamental Bible Institute, opened

its doors. Part of the first class included a 20 year-old young man,

Ervene C. Bragg, who began at that time his

lifelong ministry and close relationship with the institution, later to be known as Trinity College of Florida. Through many years of service to His Lord, that close bond between him and the college grew to include his wife, his children, his grand-children, and, in recent years, even his great-grand-children. The daily course of the family was totally bound up with Trinity as an integral part of their daily lives and its activities.



Young Ervene

The Beginning

Being wholly the Lord's began in Ervene's life at the age of six. He was led to the Lord by a faithful Sunday School teacher, Ida Puffer, at a Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in Miami, where he grew up. In a mini-biography, he writes of that decision, "In those tender years the grace of God was real to me and salvation was a blessed reality." Later, at the age of 13 during a revival meeting, he knelt in consecration of himself to full-time Christian service whatever, whenever, and wherever the Lord would lead. After

coming to Bible college, Ervene wasted no time getting involved in

ministry. He preached his first full sermon at the Cleveland Street Mission in Tampa in September 1932. He called his message "A God Sent Witness;" that fully surrendered walk and witness, fostered and grew through his days at Trinity, became the hallmark of his life and ministry. In his salutatorian address in the first graduating class, Ervene stated, "Not until we abide in God's perfect will, resting in His guidance, can we vie with the Psalmist, 'He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake," Psalm 23:3. Trinity instilled in Ervene a desire to walk those paths and be God's man; he never wavered from that commitment to his Lord.

During his days at Trinity, Ervene preached in many churches, youth rallies, and meetings. His records indicate that he preached 94 times around Tampa and its vicinity while a student at Trinity. In the summer of 1933 at his first pastorate,

a little mission church started by Dr. Watson in a movie theater in Largo, Ervene met his future bride, Pauline Mixon, who was just 16 at that time and was playing the piano for the little group of worshippers. They were married in June of 1935 and thus began the time when the family became a part of Trinity. Pauline also attended Trinity after they were married.

Early Ministry

After graduating as president of the first class, Ervene began about ten years of pastorates, mostly in Alliances churches in Daytona Beach, Lumberton,

Carolina (Dr. Watson's home church) and Roanoke, Virginia and was involved in evangelistic meetings in Alabama. He was ordained under the C&MA

in November, 1934. In 1942 he returned to Florida permanently, settling at that time in Largo. By then, the family

had increased by two children Kenneth and Mary. Donald and Peggy were born after the return to Florida. He began his lifelong service to the Lord at Trinity where he taught Systematic Theology, Christian Apologetics, Christian Psychology, Hermeneutics, and the course that he uniquely developed, Pauline Theology. He also preached in youth rallies, churches, conferences, and served as summer interim pastor for Dr. Watson's church, the Gospel Tabernacle in St. Petersburg. From that time, God used him at Trinity until his death in 1995 in the lives of young people, preparing them for service and ministry.

Ervene set up his home and family in New Port Richey, FL. Dr. Watson had bought the Hacienda Hotel and planned to move the college to that town from St. Petersburg. Buying a house and setting up a jewelry store in New Port Richey meant the family was settled there even though the school later went to Belleair. The jewelry store and his watch-making abilities became the bread and butter for the family as, through most of his years, Ervene received only gas money for his service at Trinity. He used to say, "I would pay Trinity for the privilege of teaching there as that is where God wants me to be." In his Bible, Ervene wrote, "May God the Father speak His Word to my heart as its source; may God the Son freshen His Word to my heart as its message; and may God the Holy Spirit quicken His Word to my heart as its life and power."

> That commitment permeated his life and became the motivation of a life-long learner of the Word; giving it out to all he met and living it before the world.

Ervene's life, because of his surrender to the Lord and training at Trinity, became not just head-knowledge but a heart living, exemplifying that of "practicing what you preach." One year, in his Monday evening Bible class, he was teaching on the verse, "Rejoice in the Lord always: and again I say, Rejoice" (Philippians 4:4). That night he was rousted out of bed around midnight with the news that the jewelry store had been broken into and many things were taken. Insurance only covered what was stored in the safe so the loss was substantial. After dealing with the police and boarding up the store, he came home, got the entire family out of bed, and prayed with us, thanking God for what had transpired. He quoted Job 1:21, "The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord." My sister Mary remarked on how that blessed her and remained

as a testimony of just how much Dad trusted God in all things. I will never forget that astounding example of love and faith in the Lord despite the circumstances. He learned these lessons at Trinity through the Spirit and the Word and applied it faithfully in his life.

A Family Affair

By that time, Ervene was firmly established as a professor at Trinity. All through the years, the family spent hundreds of hours at the college: Friday and Saturday evening services, Sunday afternoon vespers, graduations, meetings,

school picnics and many other activities. It was always a treat to be there among the students and the faculty. We were treated like beloved members of

the family. Dr. & Mrs. Watson, the faculty, and the students made a lasting impression on each one of us. The people of Trinity impacted our lives for the Lord just as it had for our father during his years as a student. The people were why we loved to go there.

First, we were influenced by Dr. Watson, in the same way so many others had, by his life and work at Trinity. I loved to hear him lead the services. He always began with "All Hail the Power," singing at the top of his lungs and often beginning off-key but, oh, how he showed a passion for the Lord. We all knew him as a praying man, one of great faith. Story after story came as a result of Dr. Watson's praying for food to feed the students, money to pay the bills, and always believing the Lord would provide. He set the tone for the importance of prayer. No one ever left his office but that he prayed with them. We used to say that even if you went into the office to change a light bulb, he would pray with you before you left. Knowing his example of faith and prayer made a deep impression on the life of the family.

We also greatly loved and respected the faculty and staff members. I could never name them all, but so many made a lasting impression and influence on us as a family and individually. I remember how heartbroken I felt upon learning that Dr. Auginbaugh had gone to be with the Lord the summer before I entered Trinity as a student. I had been looking forward with great anticipation to learning under that dear saint of the Lord. These faculty members always treated us, even as little children, as part of the "family" of Trinity. We watched their lives; we saw their love for God; we observed their support, encouragement and love for the students; and we were touched by their service to the Lord. What an invaluable heritage we enjoyed and lasting influence for the Lord on our lives as "children" of Trinity and the Lord!

We also greatly benefited from the lives of the godly men and women that come through Trinity for the Bible conferences. Some of these saints of the Lord exemplified a tremendous example of what God could do through the life of a wholly surrendered Christian. We benefited from their messages but more from their lives and love for the Lord. As a student at Trinity, I had close contact with many of them. Through their lives, treatment of us, and sharing the message of the Lord, I learned the true meaning of "greatness" in the Lord; being well-known only granted you status in the world, not before God. Dr. Oswald J. Smith spent quite a bit of time with me one day. I had started to write poetry and, of course, he had written hundreds of hymns. He did not have to take time with me, give me pointers and just share, but he did. That made such an impression on me. The humility that most of these great saints showed before the Lord served as a tremendous example. It was never about them, but the life of the Lord in them.

The students had a great impact on us as well. Many spent hours in our home and with the family. We were able to learn from them, not by being taught

but just to see their surrendered lives, their desire to serve, their love for the Lord, and their patience and care for us as children. They took the time to help us in the Lord. We watched as they gave their lives up for service and spent them for God in the far-flung corners of the earth. They knew hardships and difficulties; they knew defeats but they also exhibited faith, love, and victory in the Lord. My personal salvation came about because of the summer camp ministry of Hazel and Percy Cannon. How could I ever express what that meant to me! I could never begin to list them all or to ever really explain just how greatly they affected

my life and walk with the Lord. I thank God for each and every one of them and that I had the privilege to grow up in their lifetime and see what God could do with a surrendered life.

More Than a Professor

Art Yohner remarked to my brother Don about Dad, "Your dad was more than a professor; He taught the students how to live and love by his example." As a part of the Bragg family, I can say, as do we all, that the people involved were what made

Trinity the blessing, encouragement, challenge, and joy that it has always been in our lives. All of the best memories and times are wrapped up with those saints of the Lord that composed and remain the Trinity family. They, too, taught how to walk with God and be His people to the world. Our family has been influenced by Trinity all through the years. From Ervene's graduation, to two of the children's graduation, and one grand-child's and one great-grand-child's graduation from Trinity, the college has been a part of the family. It will always be a place where we know God reigns supreme, truth is preached, lives are changed, and service to the Lord

We are all extremely thankful that God placed us in the family that He did where a college like that could be a part of our lives. As was remarked to me recently, our very DNA resounds with Trinity in every part of our being. That is a heritage that remains very precious as it helped to shape who we have become today. It was always there as a vital part of our lives. The presence of the Trinity "family" stayed with us in the crises of our family, praying us through, helping us in practical ways, ministering to our spiritual needs, and showing us how we, too, should live before the Lord. The value of that will only be fully realized

in eternity both in our lives and the lives of all the people it touched since it came into existence 80 years ago. Trinity will hold always a very special place in the lives and hearts of the Bragg family.






80 YEARS OF MEMORIES


We had a project to do for Bible Customs class with Rev. Nussbaum, and Martha Lowell decided to do her project on Bible funeral customs. She had a
