

A Servant Heart for Growing Minds by Kevin D. O'Farrell

very exciting when a student gets it. You want them to understand. It's a rewarding feeling," says Faye Millan as she sits behind her desk at the Day Spring Academy for Education and the Arts in Port Richey, Florida. Faye, the 2003 Valedictorian of Trinity College of Florida, is

entering her sixth year of teaching. For the previous five years, she taught third grade at the Spring Hill Christian Academy before joining the faculty at Day Spring. The Day Spring Academy is a charter school founded in 2000 and operates separate elementary and middle school campuses. Since its inception, Day Spring has earned an "A" each year by the Florida Department of Education for its ability to produce students which exceed state mandated requirements. It is at Day Spring Academy where Faye Millan finds herself with a new class of students eager to begin each day.



Faye's philosophy regarding teaching is simple: Strive for Excellence. "We need to teach with excellence. We need to believe our students can learn and not walk into a classroom and think a child won't get it," believes Faye. The field of education is a vast and challenging arena. Teachers today are often overworked and underpaid. They are entrusted with the cognitive and social development of young minds and are asked to embrace some of the most difficult scenarios. Competing forces push and pull within the field of education and teachers often feel the effects of this constant struggle.

Yet Faye Millan only sees one challenge, "The only challenge you face is if you don't rely on God for help. When you rely on God, He gives wisdom. You'll even get ideas on the spur of the moment to help with a challenging situation. If you don't rely on God, things are more difficult. When you take it on your own, the challenges are tough because you are trying in your own strength."







Faye's own journey to becoming a teacher began when she was completing her senior year of high school. At the time, her mother was substitute teaching at Spring Hill Christian Academy. Her



mother asked the Principal if Faye could substitute for a pre-kindergarten class. The Principal agreed and Faye took her first step towards teaching. "I'm a people person and I enjoyed teaching the kids, working with them, and encouraging them." As the daughter of two parents with multiple degrees in counseling, Faye thought she would follow her parents' career choice and major in counseling in college. However, her stint as a substitute teacher opened her eyes to the world of teaching.

Faye's mom passed away in February 2008 but she left behind a lasting legacy. "God used my mom. She was an awesome lady. She

loved the Lord and she taught us the Word of God. God used her to pour into my life and my sister's life. God used her to pour into us and now we are pouring into others," says Faye.

Growing Influence

As Faye prepared to enter college, she chose Trinity College of Florida because it was a smaller Christian college within commuting


distance and had a solid education program. It was through her experiences at



Not only were professors influential in Faye's development, but also the staff at the College was used to impact her life. God used executive personnel, like Billie Skinner, to provide needed

encouragement. "Billie Skinner was a personal mentor to me. She is a beautiful, elegant lady. She would write a scripture verse on a card and place it in my mail box. I kept those cards. It was just what I needed to get through the day," Faye recounts. Mentor's like these gave Faye the tools and support she needed to strive for excellence while allowing her to grow academically and spiritually.

Growing Need

When asked what is the greatest reward received from teaching, Faye quickly responds, "Seeing the Lord change people." Faye sees her role as a tool for changing lives. "It excites me to see how God can use me to help people. It is Him working through me." Faye recounts of one young student in her class who suffered from turrets. At the beginning of the year the young boy was on medication and having a difficult time in class. Faye was concerned about the boy's progress and social interaction with the other children. Over the course of the year she maintained a patient and positive attitude while praying for her troubled student. By the end of the school year, a change had taken place. "He was off his medication and much more at ease in class. I really began to understand him and his needs," remembers Faye.

Although relatively new in the field of education, Faye has witnessed two great needs which exist at the heart of teaching. "As teachers, we need to love our students and be open to asking God for wisdom rather than relying on what we know," believes Faye. These simple yet profound statements capture the heart of Faye Millan. She believes strongly in the critical role education plays in the overall development of a child, "For children, these are very important years. Teachers have an important role to play in their lives."

Growing Gratitude

Faye Millan is a grateful person. She is grateful for her family who exposed her early to the Word of God and helped her build a strong foundation of Faith. She is grateful for Trinity College of Florida and the people who have and continue to make an impact on her life. "God directed my steps to Trinity and it worked out beautifully." And she is grateful for the calling of being a teacher, "For Christians, teaching is a calling. A calling God has put in peoples' lives," adds Faye. For Faye Millan, it's all about having a servant heart and it is that servant heart which God can use to grow minds to change the world!








2008 Banquet & Graduates

here I was, about to embark into uncharted regions of my heart wondering if I was ready to give myself to raw ministry. As I stood in the midst of Belo Horizonte, Brazil, my focus quickly turned from what I wanted to accomplish to how God would use me. I was ready and willing to see what God would do on this missions trip.

Outside a Comport Zone

I started the trip with a lack of sleep; but when I reached the church in Belo Horizonte I realized it was worth it all. We arrived at 1:30 am Saturday and the families we were to stay with were waiting for us. I couldn't believe the servant hearts of our host families. My Portuguese was very limited and my host family did not speak English. I was worried it would be strange to live with a family I didn't know, but God had a way of working everything out. Being outside of my comfort zone in a new culture and new language was a huge growing period.

I was fascinated by the fact the team did not know exactly what we were doing on this trip, It was the uncertainty which broke me out of my mold and prepared me for the ministry God wanted. Little did I know I was going to be singing in Portuguese during the trip. It was great to have my perfectionism thrown out the window. I was able to make mistakes and realize God was still receiving the glory and honor. Regardless of how I felt, I knew the message of Christ was being proclaimed and that was what mattered most. The

challenge about raw ministry is making oneself able and willing to do anything on a moment's notice for God's glory.

Teaching Sunday School to people my parents' age was a daunting experience. I wanted to make sure the message of God came across accurately and clearly. I was nervous beforehand but it was during these times the power of God showed through. In my weakness His strength was shown. It was during those raw ministry moments, I witnessed the Holy Spirit moving mightily through myself and my team.

Opportunities at the Square

Later in the trip, we visited the city square; a bustling place full of people and activity. It was here we had another raw ministry opportunity. What was originally to be a sightseeing day in Ouro Preto, changed. The city square became the perfect place to evangelize and connect with people. What was to be a short trip turned into a witnessing opportunity spanning several hours. I had the idea of getting a group picture at the square for the college. Here we met a group of kids and soon realized this would be a wonderful place to reach people with the news of Christ. Within a heavily Catholic area, KB, a fellow teammate, gave an impromptu Christian rap concert from the large statue in the center of the square. With music blasting from the van, the news of Christ could be heard throughout the square. While KB performed, the team prayed. God was moving in the square. Sowing the seeds of Christ was amazing but even more amazing was the life of one gentleman brought to Christ. Minutes after starting a relationship with Christ, he went to others around him and started sharing Christ with them!

Open Hearts at Public Schools

A highlight of the trip was being allowed into the public schools in Brazil; this was the first time the school allowed such an experience. We weren't allowed to talk about anything "religious"; but through our involvement with the kids, they were able to see something in our lives that attracted them. Children in Brazil love rap music. Most of the children were brought to the church through KB's rap and testimony. It was at the church that we were allowed to openly talk with the kids about Christ. That night after our first meeting at the school, many

children came and accepted Christ as their personal Lord and Savior. It was then that the emotions of the last two days struck me and I couldn't hold them in any longer. Seeing children's lives reached with the message of Christ struck at my core and I could do nothing but cry, having an inward joy that was beyond explanation.

As I longed for more to do, we moved from Belo Horizonte to Sao Benedito. We had another chance to minister in the public school. Word had spread that "the Americans" were coming and the kids looked forward to our arrival. Little did we know that the entire school would come out to see us. Many of the kids heard the gospel and later that evening we invited them to come to the church for our community block party. By this time my energy level had been exhausted. It felt like I could give no more but God gave me the strength to sing again that night. It was a great time of ministry.

Open Lives to Christ's Call

When I think back to the trip and what it meant to me, I can only picture the Cross and Christ's message. It is only Christ who gives our lives meaning and purpose. People have a hole in their heart that can only be filled by Christ. It was through this realization that one particular passage of Scripture hit me. Nahum 1:7 "The Lord is good, A stronghold in the day of trouble, And He knows those who take refuge in Him". It was on the cross were Christ's arms were stretched out wide and invited people to come to Him. It is this same ministry that is continuing around the world. By taking refuge in Christ we learn our lives have to be taken up into the life of Christ. The raw ministry I experienced helped me understand this truth. My prayer is we all live this type of raw ministry in the first person.

The Vice President for Advancement is a member of the President's Cabinet and reports directly to the President. The Office for Advancement oversees all fund-raising (operational and capital giving), alumni relations, public relations, and marketing activities for Trinity College of Florida.

Dr. Martin has wide-range fundraising and public relations experience, overseeing several multi-

million dollar capital campaigns and the rapid expansion of the 6,000 member First Baptist Church of Indian Rocks (FBCIR) campus located in Largo, Florida. Under his tenure at FBCIR as Senior Pastor for thirty-seven years, Dr. Martin led the church through several relocations and building projects. In 1984, he was responsible for beginning the Indian Rocks Christian School, which has graduated over 530 students. He also gave leadership to begin and expand other programs which include: The Solid Rock Company; the Memorial Ministry and Memorial Gardens; the establishment of a Medical Clinic to serve the needs of the community; and The Heron House, an assisted living facility dedicated to meeting the needs of senior adults and their families.



THE LAST WORD

The GROWING Choice

For a high school student, choosing the right college or university is one of the most important decisions of one's life. I can think of possibly two more life decisions which are of more importance, but even then the college choice affects the other two. There are numerous life decisions made during the four or five years spent in college. So how do I choose the right school for me? Why would the Lord want me to attend a Christian college rather than a state school? Let me provide you some reasons I have discovered over the years from personal experience.

Growing Academically in Knowledge & Truth Attending a Christian college is important in the realm of

Attending a Christian college is important in the realm of academics because each course is taught with a Christian World View and a World Christian View. For example, the Christian World View means that in teaching science you begin with the hypothesis that God created the universe with a plan. In literature and history you approach and analyze these subjects with professors who believe the Bible is the Word of God. In English Literature there are so many Christian writers, it is beneficial to have professors who understand the authors' positions in relation to Scripture.

The World Christian View emphasizes that in each discipline the foundation is a concern for all of mankind, not one of ethnocentricity. God wants you to be included in His master plan. God is concerned about you understanding the universe and your place in it. God has a place in what has and what will happen and a Christian college facilitates this discovery and journey.

Thomas Jefferson, when he founded the University of Virginia, stated he wanted each graduate to have a thorough knowledge of three disciplines: English, History, and the Bible. This is what a student receives from a Christian college. At a Christian college, students are required to study a number of Bible courses, not just as literature but as the Word of God. In these courses students study under professors who invest individual time with students. At a school like Trinity, you are seen as a person, not a number.

What a difference it makes to begin each class sincerely praying for the needs of fellow students. There are weekly chapel services held on campus where the Bible becomes more than a textbook. Outstanding men and women of God share their walk in the Lord and encourage students to follow Christ. Riley, Roy Gustoson, Billy Graham, Charles Martin, and many more.
