The Secret in Giving

Recently, Harvard researchers conducted a survey on individual spending habits and happiness. One experiment involved tracking individuals' spending habits in the course of one day. In this experiment participants were given \$5 or \$20 to spend on themselves, someone else or donate to charity. The spending had to be accomplished by the end of the day, after which the participants were surveyed regarding their level of happiness. The researchers found that the amount of money the participants were given had no measurable effect on their level of happiness. What impacted their level of happiness was how the money was spent. Participants who spent the money on a gift for someone else or who gave it to charity experienced a significant boost in happiness while those who spent the money on themselves did not.

In their book, Well Being: The Five Essential Elements, Tom Rath and Jim Harter state that while material items lose their novelty, individuals can relive memories indefinitely through the act of giving. Giving creates a lasting and rich legacy that is unmatched in personal fulfillment.

The Bible presents a powerful secret too! Read what the apostle Paul wrote in 2 CORINTHIANS 8:1-2 NLT:

"Now I want to tell you, dear friends, what God in His kindness has done for the churches in Macedonia. Though they have been

going through much trouble and hard times, their wonderful joy and deep poverty have overflowed in rich generosity."

How is this possible? How does "much trouble, hard times, and deep poverty overflow in rich generosity?" This can't be! But read on:

"Best of all, they went beyond our highest hopes, for their first action was to dedicate themselves to the Lord." 2 CORINTHIANS 8:5 NLT

Do you see it? The secret in giving is found in someone else, not in you and what you possess! It is in the Lord! Let me take you further:

As believers, we are channels. God is the resource! As believers, we are stewards. God is the owner of all!

God channels through us what He gives us. He distributes His resources through people to people; blessing and enriching both and glorifying Himself. He thoroughly enjoys this methodology. He gives to us so that we may give to others. Warren Weirsbe captured this in his definition of ministry:

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
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Mobilizing the Body of Christ works together, nothing When the Body of Christ works together, nothing

When the Body of Christ works together, nothing compares. That truth is best illustrated by the unselfish acts of Tim Smith's brothers and sisters in Christ. Their mission: raise \$31,000 for new prosthetic legs for a college student. This was not an ordinary assignment, but then again, Tim was not an ordinary college student.

NO ORDINARY YOUNG MAN

As a young man Tim wrestled with rage, anger, and frustration at what appeared to be a great disability in his life. Tim was born with no lower legs. At times, he felt isolated and different from his peers. "It hurt me deeply to think people were laughing at me and making me feel I couldn't do things. They were making me feel useless because I didn't have any legs. Sometimes I even felt like I wanted to blame God," recounts Tim.

After he graduated from high school, Tim began to realize God had a purpose for his life. God's purpose was greater than Tim's trying to prove to everyone he could do the things people with legs could

do. Tim began to realize God was the Grand Designer. "God didn't mess up when he created me. It didn't catch Him by surprise. It's not as though he said, 'Whoa! What happened here? He has no legs!' God knew what He was doing when he made me; He had a reason," touts Tim.

At first, he thought he might spend his life in the field of orthopedic medicine and prosthetics, but God had another calling. Tim, originally from New Jersey, enrolled at Trinity College of Florida in the fall of 2008 to pursue a degree in pastoral ministries and found a supportive Christcentered community. It was in this setting that God would mobilize the Body of Christ to do something only He could accomplish.

NO ORDINARY FRIEND

It began when Tim's friend and fellow Trinity student, Daniel
Rumeau, felt a burden to explore ways to get Tim new legs.
Earlier, Tim had led a fundraising effort to collect money
from other students to pay for a round-trip ticket for
Daniel to visit his mother in New Jersey
who was recently diagnosed
with cancer. Now, Daniel
knew it was his turn to
return the effort and

Daniel got in contact with Hanger Prosthetics and Orthotics. After meeting

with Hanger, it was estimated that Tim's new legs would cost \$31,000. This was a huge sum for anyone to raise, not to mention a massive sum for a struggling college student. While Tim wondered from where the money would come, Daniel went to work organizing others to come to Tim's aid.

Tim's local church, Jasmine
Lakes Baptist Church, raised a
couple thousand dollars. Trinity
College of Florida took an offering
from students, faculty, staff and friends
towards the cost of the legs. Together, the
combined total was over \$10,000 towards the cost
of Tim's new legs. But with only a third of the cost
covered, they were still well below the needed amount.

Could they reach their goal? Was the effort "running out of steam?" Would Tim receive the desperately needed new legs? The Body of Christ was certainly active but after announcements, offerings, emails, and phone calls, was anyone listening? Was the Body of Christ paying attention? Or worse, did anyone care? Those involved in the effort knew God was orchestrating events but with time running out and Tim's old prosthetics legs crumbling, even the faithful felt shaken. Yet in this crisis of belief, God was not finished.

NO ORDINARY GIFT

Word reached Trinity College of Florida that a local couple felt led by the Lord to cover the outstanding funds needed to provide new prosthetic legs for Tim. The outstanding amount needed: \$21,000. Like Daniel

Rumeau, Gavin and Leanna Floyd felt compelled to help provide Tim with new legs. Gavin, the starting pitcher for the Chicago White Sox, was amazed by Tim's story. "We are so encouraged by Tim's example of perseverance. To know that Tim has found Christ in his life and has been able to overcome so many challenges is an inspiration," says Gavin. Since finding Christ in his own life, Gavin with his wife, Leanna, had been praying and asking God to show them how to be a blessing to others.

The generous couple became aware of Tim's story through Leanna's mother, who had heard of the need through Trinity College. Gavin and Leanna were overjoyed to help Tim and believed God had placed them in a unique position to accomplish God's will. "We know that the scriptures teach, 'From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked.' We want to be good stewards of God's resources," says Leanna, adding, "God has blessed Gavin and me beyond our wildest dreams. For us there is no greater feeling than giving to someone else, especially when that gift honors God."

When Tim heard the news that all the funding was secured for his new prosthetic legs, he was overwhelmed. Tears, smiles and shouts of joy flowed from him. The magnitude of what had happened was incredible. "I was ecstatic and so in love with God." remembers Tim. The love and providence of God was present in a tangible act and enshrined in a new set of limbs.





a God-Shaped Void

Because my husband is a professional athlete, I have had the opportunity to meet and interact with a lot of individuals who are "rich" by most standards; however, some of those individuals are unhappy. At first I had a difficult time understanding this; but as I inquired more, I discovered there was a God-shaped void in their lives and the material things of this world only brought them temporal happiness, not a stable and enduring feeling of contentment or joy. These shocking findings led me to delve into the topic of happiness and to ask the questions: "What is happiness and how is it obtained?"

Scholars have offered a wide range of ideas regarding happiness.

They include Donald Latumahina's idea that happiness is a decision one makes and Mohandas Gandhi's belief that happiness is the direct result of the tranquility created when an individual's thoughts, words, and actions are in harmony. For a working definition, let's agree that happiness is more or less a state of well-being and contentment that is pleasurable in nature. Generally speaking, happiness is a state of being most of us strive to achieve. Some believe wealth, fame, and success will bring happiness. However, there is a significant number of people who have the aforementioned things and are not happy.

Whether you are watching television, reading a magazine, or driving down the road, one is bombarded with images of shiny new cars, models draped in diamonds, and large mansions with gorgeous lawns. The people in these advertisements are always smiling, laughing, and enjoying life thus fooling us into thinking that to be "happy" like them we too must have these "things." Those material possessions are considered treasures by earthly standards.

Biblical Truth

Unlike the world's view of acquiring tangible items or the idea that wealth makes one happy, the Bible tells us "richness" is not the amount of money we have but rather what we do with our resources. God's Word instructs us to, "Use [our] money to do good. [We] should be rich in good works and generous to those in need, always being ready to share with others. By doing this [we] will be storing up [our] treasure as a good foundation for the future so that [we] may experience true life" I TIMOTHY 6:18-19, NLT. LUKE 6:38 NLT implores us to "Give, and you will receive. Your gift will return to you in full...running over, and poured into your lap. The amount you give will determine the amount you get back."

Giving vs. Keeping

Given the state of our economy and the personal finances of many, some may be hesitant to give of their time, money, or resources to others. With such conditions, individuals tend to use various aversive coping strategies to justify why Biblical principles of giving do not apply to their circumstances. When people hold conflicting beliefs, they experience a feeling of psychological discomfort. For instance, if one believes they should tithe their income but simultaneously feels giving away their money will cause financial hardship, the two conflicting beliefs collide, resulting in feelings of uneasiness and discomfort. This dissonance will adversely affect their emotional and psychological well-being.

Some psychological theorists, particularly those who practice cognitivebehavioral techniques, believe an individual's thoughts directly influence one's feelings, which influence actions. For instance, if one lives in fear of "not having enough," then, most likely, their behavioral response will be to conserve or hoard. It is crucial to avoid this pitfall by identifying these thoughts and replacing them with Biblical Truth.

When one engages in giving activities such as volunteering time. effort, and treasure, then the behaviors related to giving can positively affect negative or conservatory thinking and subsequently enhance one's psychological and emotional well-being.



a Giving High

Researchers have studied the impact of giving on an individual's physical and emotional states. Studies have shown the act of giving literally has a physical benefit by causing a reduction in the production

of stress hormones, such as cortisol. Researchers believe if one engages in various helping activities such as volunteering time, one is less likely to focus on stressors and is able to switch their attention to the happiness and joy that comes from helping others. As a result, individuals are less likely to be stressed.



Social change advocate Allan Luks examined the physical effects of helping others. He found individuals who regularly volunteered and helped others experienced the same health benefits of people who regularly engaged in vigorous exercise or reflective meditation. Luks concluded, positive social contact with others released endorphins which resulted in a less agitated and stressful condition in the giver.

Getting Practical

Clearly, there are many benefits to participating in altruist acts. Not only does the recipient earn benefits but the giver also enjoys benefits. In giving to others, you are in reality blessing yourself. There are many practical ways to give back and volunteer. For example:

- · share your knowledge and expertise with others at a local school or church.
- donate used clothes and various household items to local agencies such as Goodwill or the Salvation Army,
- contact your local hospice and volunteer to help care for others in need.
- visit nursing and retirement homes to offer companionship, or
- · donate goods to local food pantries.

There is a plethora of things one can do to give. The Bible instructs us to give with a spirit of generosity. By doing so, this will determine the type and degree of blessing we receive in this life and life to come.

So, what is happiness and how is it obtained? The world tries to fool us that we are rich and happy based on the quantity and quality of the material things we have here on Earth. The Bible tells us that we are rich and well to do when we store up our treasures in heaven which brings us genuine happiness and joy.



SPANISH LESSONS

"Spain? God, are you sure?" I felt like I was having a hard time understanding God, even though He seemed to speak so clearly. I didn't feel called to Spain or even to Europe for that matter. Confused at the direction God seemed to be leading, I still moved forward to become a short term missionary to Spain.

Many Questions

Thirteen months after questioning God, I arrived in Spain. I thought, "What have I gotten myself into?" The thought of spending the next four months by myself in Spain both excited and terrified me. What if I turned out to be a horrible teacher? What if I couldn't learn the language? What if I hated living in Spain? The "what ifs" crowded my head while fear took over my heart and tears filled my eyes.

Then came the whisper, "Be still, and know that I am God." and the Whisperer silenced my fears. I felt ashamed at my thoughts. Who was I to doubt my God, who is greater than I can even imagine? Surely God led me to Spain and surely He would provide.

A Student Teacher

After a few short days, God began to open my eyes and heart and I quickly fell in love with the people and their culture. I began to see the deepness of their need for the gospel. My primary purpose in going to Spain was to fulfill my studentteaching requirements as an elementary education major at Trinity College of Florida.

God provided an amazing school for me to teach at in Madrid, Spain called the Evangelical Christian Academy. I was placed

in a small third classroom four With Evangelical Academy being a missionary school, I was surprised

one American missionary child, one Spaniard, and two Koreans.

On the first day of classes, I discovered one of my sweet Korean students did not speak English. I thought, "God, my education classes didn't cover this!" I wondered why had God placed me in such a small

classroom? Then one day I discovered this precious Korean student, who spoke no more than a few rehearsed English phrases, would not have been accepted into the school had it not been for an additional student-teacher in the classroom. Furthermore, it just so happened that this girl came from a non-Christian family. This was an opportunity God had dropped into my lap! For four months, I was able to teach my students the gospel in Bible class, to sit at recess and share my faith with all the elementary students and to encourage those students who were believers.

Expanding Mission


God also allowed me to become involved in the lives of the local middle and high school students. The principal let me lead a few after school clubs including volleyball and ultimate frisbee. I cherished these moments with the older

Some of them came from non-Christian families and some were first generation believers. Even with God giving me so many opportunities to serve within the school, I longed to reach out to the surrounding community and do more.

The Bible says to "delight in the Lord, and He will give you the desires of your heart." PSALMS 37:4 Well, that is exactly what happened. I wanted to do more, but saw no opportunities to do so. I began to get discouraged in my work. Even though I trusted God to show me where and how I could serve, I began to get impatient. In the process of waiting, God taught me to rejoice in all things and be content with where He had me.

Once I learned the lesson of contentment in Christ, God showered me with opportunities over the course of a few weeks. I was able to help with English camps, youth retreats and other evangelistic outreaches with the missionaries and churches in the area. God also opened my eyes to see the huge opportunity that had been right outside my door.

Locked Out

On the first night on my own, after going for a walk around the town, I locked myself out of my apartment. I still had the keys in my hand but the door would not open. With no nearby missionaries, I played charades with my neighbor to communicate I needed help. I felt like a failure of a missionary for not being able to open my own front door.

"God, what are you doing to me?" I thought. Three hours and seven people later, the door was dismantled and I spent the night with the door propped shut with a mop handle. Little did I know that night would turn out to be one of the biggest blessings of my time in Spain.

On that crazy night, I spent two hours talking with my landlady. She realized I wanted (and needed) to learn Spanish and offered me lessons in exchange for English lessons for her daughter. I was at her house twice a week for lessons. God finally allowed me to see His big picture.

Their family adopted me as their own and through that relationship God allowed me the privilege and honor of being the first

person to share the Gospel with this family. Though I never got to personally lead them to Christ, my prayer is that God continues to work in their lives and bring others to witness to them.

My Home

Now, I've never been a big fan of saying goodbye, but leaving Spain was one of the hardest goodbyes I have ever had to say. Just when I began to feel at "home," it was time to leave. I struggled with being in the U.S. for a while and wanted to be back in Spain.



It was during this time that I was reading a book by Katie Davis in which she seemed to speak the very words I struggled to formulate. In her book, Davis concludes we are created with a desire for home that can only be found in heaven with Christ. My journey in Spain changed my life. While I thought I was simply going to Spain to student-teach, God had me there for so much more. He has given me a new perspective on missions, on what it means to truly be content in the Lord, and on God's bigger picture for my life. God taught me to serve where I am, to rejoice in all things, to never doubt His will, and to realize this world is not my home. He gave me a very powerful set of Spanish lessons.

"Man is the result of a purposeless and natural process that did not have him in mind." This declaration comes from the late Harvard scientist, George Gaylord Simpson, in his influential book, The Meaning of Evolution.

Simpson's claim still largely rules the thinking of the world's great universities. This became painfully clear to me as I spoke in recent years at three of the Ivy League universities—Dartmouth, Yale, and my own alma mater, Princeton.

Yes, huge cracks are appearing in this wall of Darwinian dogma, thanks in part to exciting finds in the fossil record and discoveries in DNA (see The Mysterious Epigenome: What Lies Beyond DNA). Yet, as soon as scientific cracks appear, they are busily papered over by hopeful rhetoric. The media and the scientific priesthood work together to insure that students today are still largely clueless of evidence hostile to Darwinism, whether in the U.S., Latin America, Europe or Asia.

This is a key factor with which to reckon as we pursue ministry locally and globally. Public school teachers and college professors keep implanting Darwinist lenses in the eyes of rising students. Man (and all nature), as viewed through these Darwin-colored lenses, is nothing but the product of a blind, automatic, unintelligent process embedded in the fabric of the cosmos. "Purpose" is something we create for ourselves; it comes from no higher source.

In countering this naturalistic and even nihilistic doctrine, it has been my privilege to teach theology, apologetics, and the history of science at Trinity College of Florida since 1988. It has also been my joy to go venture into secular universities to share the many evidences for a

designed cosmos—one that's brilliantly crafted by the Triune God who made us for Himself. I'm very grateful for the support of Trinity which has housed and worked closely with our apologetics outreach, The C. S. Lewis Society.

In the face of this daunting challenge, two recent frontier crossings offered wonderful hope in this task. These foreign trips underscored God's awesome power, solid truth, and overflowing grace. One was a ministry tour in Cape Town, South Africa the other was a set of talks in Lima, Peru. Here are glimpses of what happened.

"UNIVERSITY SHOCKER" IN LIMA, PERU

During the summer of 2011, invitations kept falling into place for me to give talks on "Evidence for Intelligent Design" at five different universities in Lima, Peru. So the

> university to another, along with a Christian TV station and a nationally televised seminar entitled, "Darwin or Design: Where Does the Evidence Point?"

One dimension of this trip came as a shock. Several university talks were set up by a semi-

retired medical pioneer in Lima, a former president of Peru's National Academy of Science. Amazingly, he is friendly and warm toward the theory of intelligent design. Besides being a leading intellectual pillar in that country, he is a personal friend of many leading scientists in Peru, including the current presidents of the National Academy of Medicine and the National Academy of Science. At one lecture, these two presidents were lined up to give a formal response to my presentation. I confess to feeling a bit jittery upon hearing of this! I sensed that these professors would be adamantly pro-Darwin, and assumed that I'd receive a very frosty reception—or worse. I felt like an American Daniel walking into a Peruvian lions' den.

What happened in this talk—and indeed each of the five talks was different from my expectations. Each time the audience listened

attentively, and the responses (along with each question) were thoughtful, respectful, and brimming with curiosity and intelligence. Sometimes the questioner felt that he or she was offering a knockdown refutation of some point of my talk, but that gave an opportunity for clarification--and further supporting evidence--to be shared. I survived the lions'

questions, and we were able to distribute nearly five hundred copies, in Spanish, of the brilliant documentary on intelligent design, *Unlocking the Mystery of Life*.



FOUR DAYS IN CAPE TOWN

Earlier in March of 2011, I found myself

in front of 140 faculty and students who came to a luncheon, titled "Evidence for Design: The Signature of Intelligence." It was presented in a bowl-shaped auditorium in a central location of the most prestigious campus which was huddled at the foot of Table Mountain in Cape Town, South Africa. At this presentation, the first of four such talks on Design Evidences, it was clear during the Q&A session that the group was largely skeptical of my point of view. A science professor tried to rebut what I said by claiming that a renowned ID biologist whose research I quoted had been effectively "rubbished" by scientific colleagues. I replied by pointing out the many cogent responses of this scientist to his critics which are widely ignored. An agnostic student named Tom was ready at the first talk, and in subsequent talks, with a feisty objection to what I had just said.

To say that these four talks were exciting, yet also very challenging, would be an understatement. I asked the Lord for guidance, and sought to rely on Him, not my own resources and abilities.

On day two and three, attendance remained strong, and I sensed a pivot in audience attitude—from being strongly skeptical or even hostile to the idea of design,

to being open and genuinely interactive to the material I shared. After each lecture, I was surrounded by a dozen or more students who pelted me with good, hard questions—just the kind I love.

On day four, I finished presenting some of the strongest evidence: discoveries of tiny complex molecular machines within our cells machines that seemed to have all the hallmarks of brilliant design. The first question, as usual, was from Tom, the skeptic. What he said was unexpected: "I think we should all be grateful for Dr. Woodward for coming from Florida to Cape Town to present several kinds of solid evidence which seems to me, show a fairly credible case for an intelligent designer. But my question is this: Could not that designer be itself a part of the cosmos, and not some being beyond the cosmos?"

Startled by this response, I thanked Tom for his kind remark, and turned to his good question. I pointed out that the evidence for a "designed universe"—which includes all the fine-tuned laws of nature such as gravity and electromagnestism—pointed to a Creator God

who transcends the cosmos, found in Genesis 1:1, not to some mysterious being or "creative force" within the cosmos. which we hear about occasionally in the writings of scientists who are pantheists.

As usual, a vigorous small-group discussion followed my lecture, and Tom the "searching skeptic" joined the circle this time. In this group I shared relevant Scripture, along with my own testimony of coming to faith out of agnostic belief during college days. Most importantly, I sensed that day that God was opening doors for truth in the most unexpected of places—even in the university that prides itself as the "Harvard" of Africa.

THE BOTTOM LINE


While the "Simpson doctrine" is still dominant around the world, I've learned two important facts. This dogma is quite vulnerable when fairly critiqued with solid evidence and good reasoning. Second, I see an open door in these discussions to the idea that the Creator has decisively revealed Himself to mankind. We have a ready-made platform from which we can introduce university students to Christ, our Designer—the true Logos who crafted our tiniest threads of DNA, and the vastness and beauty of all creation!

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




Part of Your Legacy

It was August 2008 when I stepped on the campus of Trinity College of Florida with great expectations as to what God was going

to do. I had left New Jersey and was excited about everything Florida was going to offer. If someone told me all the things God was going to do during my time at Trinity, I never would have believed them.

Yet, here I am in the spring of 2012, just weeks from graduating, and God has given me one of the biggest blessings I have ever experienced.

I arrived at Trinity with two functioning prosthetic limbs, never thinking they were going to break and if someone had told me I was going to get new prosthetics, I would have accused them of lying. But by April of 2011, my prosthetics were broken, uncomfortable, painful and in need of replacement. Little did I know, four weeks later, God provided the \$31,000 needed for new prosthetics. By November 2011 I had brand new, top of the line, prosthetics. I had gone from walking on legs akin to a 1987 Honda Civic to walking on ones like a 2012 Mercedes Benz.

How does it teel?

After hearing God's amazing story of provision, many have asked me, "What was it like to be on the receiving end of this gift?" The two emotions I had and still have to this day are: thankfulness and remembrance. I could not

buy a friend in high school, at least a real, true and genuine one; but at Trinity, God redeemed those lonely feelings. I watched as Christ encouraged my fellow friends and classmates to give money towards the prosthetics. To watch college students (who are known to struggle financially) give so sacrificially, broke my heart. They did it because of the gospel. I watched as people I never met or heard of were encouraged by Christ and moved with compassion, give generously. Doctors and

with a new pair of legs. It was overwhelming. All I could say was, "Thank you and praise God for His faithfulness!"


It keeps growing!

I've had the legs for several months and every time I put them on I am reminded of God's faithfulness to work through the body of Christ. Sometimes, a small tear wells up in the corner of my eye because of the incredible love from so many people. What makes putting on the legs awesome is that those emotions never decrease; in fact, they grow. I know thirty years from now, when I look at these prosthetics I am still going to remember everyone who prayed,

loved, cared, supported, donated, helped and worked towards blessing me with new prosthetic legs. I will never forget the people and I will never doubt God's faithfulness because my legs serve as a walking reminder of our great God.

For those of you, who are reading this, thank you! From the depths of my heart, I

am forever grateful for your sacrifice, commitment, love, prayer and support. My prayer and desire is that if this story of new prosthetics has been any encouragement to you, it is because of Christ! I pray that in the midst of whatever challenges, difficulty, hardship, or persecution you may face, Christ would find His name exalted and God be glorified. May you remember that what the world may see as a dis-ability is in fact an ability to display the Glory of God.







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
