

EV. JOHN MINDER was born at Akron. Ohio, "several years ago", and as a youth was converted there. After receiving his call to the ministry, he attended the Missionary Training Institute at Nyack, N.Y, graduated from the

Bible Department in 1919, (taking a post-graduate course in New York City graduating in 1920). Accepting a call from Dr. R. A. Forrest, who at that timt was superintendant of the Christian and Missionary Alliance of the Southeastern District. Rev. Minder and other young men came south to preach and win souls to Christ. Mr. Minder was engaged in Revival work in Alabama, Georgia, and South Carolina for several years.

His Florida ministry began in 1921 at Melrose, Florida, (conducting services in a tent), and it was at his invitation that Rev. W. T. Watson, who is now president of the Florida Bible Institute also came to Florida and joined him in Christian work. The two of them conducted many successful meetings in abandoned churches, school houses and tents in North Florida.

In 1924 Rev. Watson received a call to St. Petersburg, and Rev. Minder to Tampa. As a result of Rev. Minder's work in Tampa, the large Gospel Tabernacle of the Christian Missionary Alliance was erected. It was built under his personal supervision and is one of the largest and best arranged Tabernacles of the South. Accepting a call as Superintendent of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, he resigned as Pastor, and for several years had supervision of the Alliance work of the Southeast District.

In the Spring of 1935 Mr. Minder became a member of the faculty of the Florida Bible Institute, where he has endeared himself to the students, and has become an invaluable asset to the School. Recently he accepted the call back to the Tabernacle in Tampa, and is continuing his work as an instructor at the Institute.





building are used as dormitory rooms for the young ladies. The ground floor is used for chapel, class rooms, offices, library, study halls, etc.




The Hunter Memorial Building

The Extension Department of the Florida Bible Institute

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THE WATER of a stream that does not have sufficient outlet becomes stagnant and loses its usefulness. A citrus tree is weakened by unpicked fruit. Likewise a Christian must allow

free course to the water of life. Opportunity must be provided not only for the growth, but for the

picking of the fruit of Christian service. If not, spiritual stagnation and degeneration will follow.

To that end the function of the Extension Department of Florida Bible Institute is three-fold:

(1). To give each student an opportunity to apply practically in Christian work among strangers off the campus that which he has learned theoretically in the class room;

(2). To thus promote growth and stability of Christian character in the life of each student in such spiritual exercise;

(3). To enable Florida Bible Institute and its students to bring the blessing of Christ to the people of surrounding communities.

The Christian activities of our students have been surprisingly many and diversified. Their statistical summary for the present school year to the date of this writing is as follows:

Six Penal, county and state institutions

Four Tourist camps.

Five Spanish missions.

- Twenty Churches (of eight different denominations and nondenominational groups).
- About 350 Public services participated in or conducted by students (this does not include the regular teaching of Sunday School classes).
- About 300 definite and publicly confessed decisions for Christ have been reported from the above activities.

Street meetings, gospel solo work, home visitation, distribution of gospel tracts, preaching to prisoners, piano playing for church services, singing (trio, quartette or choir), pulpit supply, teaching children, personal work—all this and much more have F.B.I. young women and young men joyously done for their Christ in addition to their regular school work.

F.B.I. has a student pastor. Young people are studying Spanish in order to do better work for Christ in mission work among the Spanish speaking peoples, of whom there are 40,000 in Tampa. Two freshmen in their 'teens recently conducted a successful evangelistic campaign in one of the local churches, while continuing their Institute work. Calls wi.hin a radius of fifty miles of the Institute come for the services of F.B.I. young people.

Thus the radiance and fragrance of consecrated talent and constant witnessing for Christ by the youth of Florida Bible Institute has won much favor and made a profound impression upon all to whom they have ministered.

In the direction of the Extension Department, careful attention is constantly given not only to the strain upon the time and strength of the students, but upon their ability to accomplish the given assignment. Every effort is made to keep round pegs from being fitted into square holes. Scholastic credit is given for the work accomplished, as well as all help needed in its accomplishment. A careful record is kept of the same as it pertains to each student.

Throughout the year the student body have shown a fine spirit of cooperation without which the results mentioned could not have been accomplished.

A Letter from F.B.I.'s first Missionaries



MR AND MRS. HARRIS BRAGAN

"Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ,"-Eph. 5: 20.

E praise our Lord and Saviour because He has opened a door of service for us, and for the joy and happiness we receive when we are privileged to serve Him.

We just sailed to the Cayman Islands, which are located in the British West Indies about 650 miles south of Tampa in May of '36. We accompanied the four young ladies, all fellow-classmates of ours, who had worked the previous summer in the islands. Our summe'rs work was to conduct Daily Vacation Bible Schools among the children and young people, and to hold Revival Campaigns. The Lord richly blessed in the Summer's work and souls were won to Him. Our group of six workers returned to the States in November of 1936.

During the Summer, while working on Caymen Brac, one of the three Caymen Islands, we received the call from the Baptist Churches there asking us to return and work among them as their pastor. We prayed, God directed, and we sailed, alone this time, for Cayman Brac, in December of '36.

Because of destruction by storm, Cayman Brac had remained without a pastor for about six years. There was much work to do. Cayman Brac is only a small island, twelve miles long and two miles wide. It is divided into four districts. At the time of our return, only one church was standing. We praise God because in the past year He has enabled the people to rebuild the three remaining churches. And though they are not completed, we are so thankful for them, and praise Him for what He is able to do.

The population of the island is about 1500, and over fifty per cent are of the colored race. It is an English possession, and many of the people are of English ancestry. In our past year of service there we have learned to love the people, and most of all love their souls for Christ, and thank God that we can work among them.

With the responsibility of five churches, for besides the four of Cayman Brac, we have in our charge the church on the nearby island of Little Cayman, we have found that we have to work very slowly. But the Lord has seen fit to wonderfully bless the small service that we have been able to offer to Him.


During the past winter we have had, besides the regular services of each church, Bible Classes for the young people, and "Happy Hours" for the children of each district.

During the summer we had two weeks Summer Bible Schools and Revival Services each night, in each of the districts. It fills our hearts with joy and praise unto Him to be able to say that between fifty and seventy-five souls accepted Christ as their Lord and Saviour. Please pray for these; they need our prayers. And remember us in your prayers as we continue the work of the Lord. We give Him all the praise, honor, and glory for all that has been accomplished, for without Him we can do nothing. Our prayer is that Cayman Brac may be won for Jesus.

Summer Bible Schools



A FEW OF THE MANY SCHOOLS CONDUCTED BY F.B.I STUDENTS

HERE never was a period in American history when there was less religion taught in the home and in the school than today. The problems of our church, the failures of our schools, in fact the ills of our nation can be traced largely to our homes where fathers and mothers, lacking in spiritual depth of character, and unfit to be the teachers of the children, are assuming the grave responsibility of rearing and educating our future nation. Today we have 27,000 oco boys and girls classified as Protestants who are growing up practically without any religious education. In a few decades they will constitute the forces that will mold and make the masses of America. Are we going to stand by and see these boys and girls starve for the Word of God? There are only three Institutions through which we may reach the child spiritually-the home, the school, the church. The home and school have failed, and sometimes I am prone to think that our churches have failed too. The thing which the church emphasizes and reverences, the young will emphasize and reverence. It is time we were giving God first place. Whatever the church does or does not do, she must take care of her youth. The boys and girls of today are the men and women of tomorrow. If the heart of the child is the key to the future-what kind of a nation will we have

in the future, if our generation is depending on us to have men and women who are trained in the Word? If our children are to walk in the way of the Lord, they must know what His way There is no doing without knowing To 15. know what His way is, there must be a definite, systematic study of the Word, just as we study any other subject, but reverently and as the Word of God We spend approximately five hours a day, five days a week in studying the text books recommended in our public schools. With our fifty two Sundays a year, we only get twenty hours actual study in the Scriptures. If we aren't meeting this need in the Sunday School, then we must meet it in some other way. "If good seed is not planted and cultivated, all soils, and especially the richest, produce wreds, but never fruits, vegetables and flowers," The Spring season is the planting time. The Summer Bible School with its splendid curriculum is meeting this need. In two weeks study in the Scriptures, three hours daily we do more actual searching in the Word of God than in a whole year of Sunday School work The Summer Bible School with its promotions from year to year as planned, asks for only 54 000 minutes, less than one half the time devoted to the study of figures alone in our Public Schools. This is less than one-tenth the time the state requires for preparation for citizenship. Is it not reasonable that one-tenth as much time should be given to equip our youth with that knowledge that will enable them to live right here and bring them to Salvation in Christ, as to prepare them to live and make money in this world? How much more important is eternity than time! Is it reasonable to suppose that we can have good strong Christians without their knowing The Book? Through the Book, God reveals Himself. We can only know Him by knowing the Book. Jesus said: "Search the Scriptures". More than mere reading or superficial study is necessary. The Word of God must be searched as one searches for hidden treasures. The nominal Christian, ignorant of the Divine Message, is "Carried about by every wind of doctrine", and becomes an easy prey to every false teaching-Christian Science, Russelism, New Thought, and



what not The Scriptures need neither defense nor apology. If given a chance they will take care of themselves. The supreme folly of the church is that she has not been teaching the young essential things in a PRACTICAL, DEFINITE, SYSTEMATIC way. The whole aim of the S.B.S. is not to fill the pupils' heads with mere memorizing of the Scriptures we can in one summer, but to make a few portions living and real to them, to try to create a love for the Bible, and to show the pupils how to use the Spiritual Truths in the Word to meet the daily and individual problems of their lives. We believe this will be more beneficial and make them want to come another summer for more. The Scripture studied, becomes living and inspirational, not mere parrot talk. The Bible School exalts the Word. If churches would inaugurate such schools, the thermometer of the

> church would rise, the Biblical intelligence of her members would increase, all legitimate activities would develop, and chief of all, her spiritual life would deepen. This has been the testimony of many churches that have had such schools. "Life holds no deeper responsibility, and no higher privilegs than that of leading little children to know and love the Heavenly Father."

> In the past five summers the students of F.B.I. have enrolled over 40,000 children in the Summer Bible Schools, fourteen states and the British West Indies have been reached with this method of teaching. Hundreds of this number have accepted Christ as their personal Saviour. Will you help to get this "Glorious News" to them - Jesus called them unto Him, and said, "Suffer the little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of God." Blessed is the privilege, and grave is the responsibility of that person to whom is entrusted even a portion of the character development of a little child.
