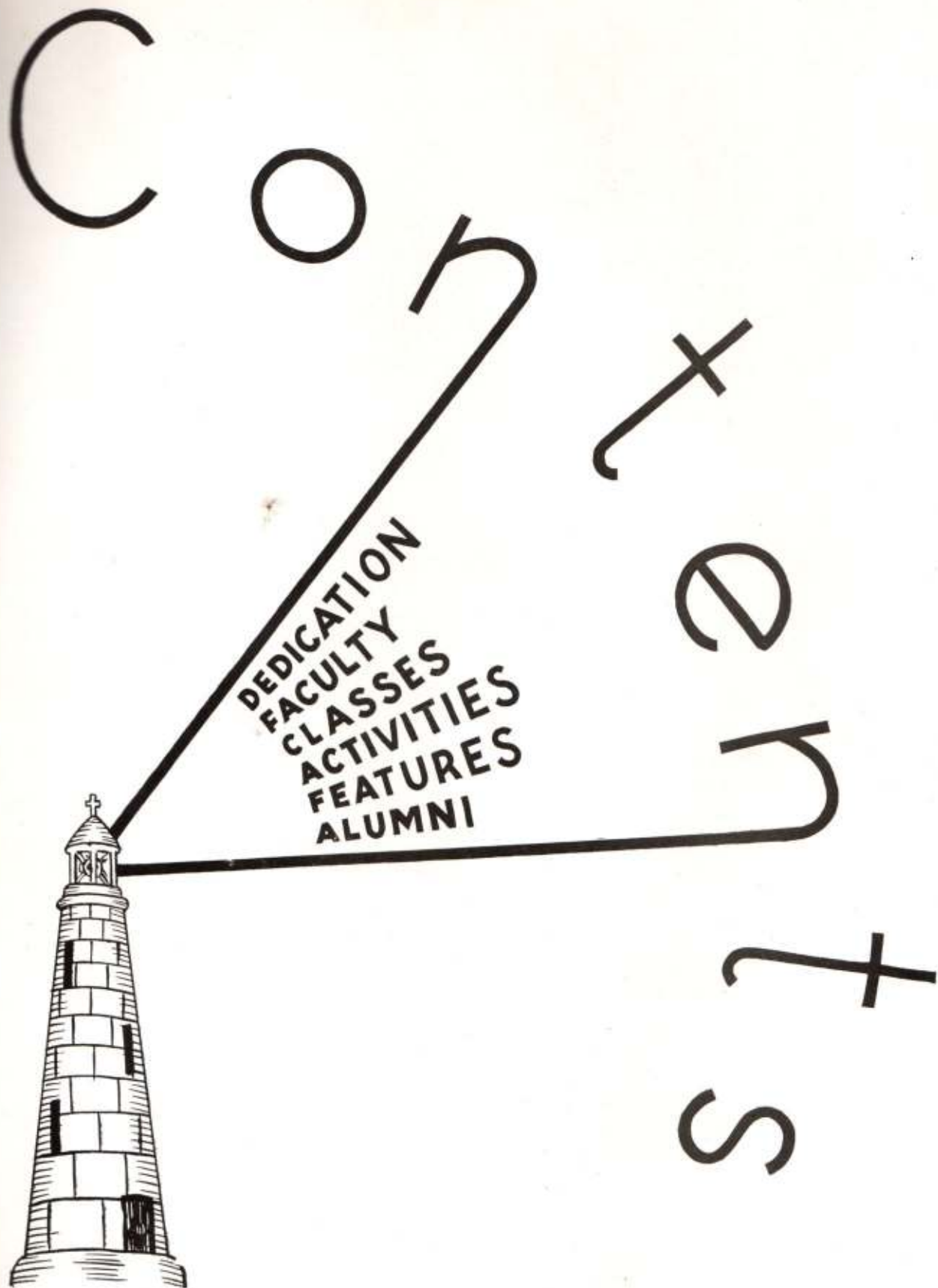


FOREWORD

The Florida Bible Institute has been true to the great commission, to "preach the Gospel to every creature." It has been one of the primary purposes of this institution from its inception and founding, to train young men and women, who will help to carry the message of salvation to the ends of the earth.

MR. AND MRS. HARRIS BRAGAN

Among those who have gone from this institution to "the regions beyond," are Mr. and Mrs. Harris Bragan, (Margaret Scott) who have been laboring in the Cayman Islands for the past three years. They have five churches on Caymen Brac island in which they are doing a heroic piece of work for the Lord. A little daughter, named Carolyn Ann, has recently come to their home, to bless and cheer them. They write: "The Lord has been so real and precious to us, as we have sought to serve Him here in the little island of Cayman Brac. We find in Jesus a true friend, and faithful to all His promises."

MR. AND MRS. HOWARD STREET

Rev. and Mrs. Howard Street, (Rene Corley) also of our Alumni, sailed in October 1938 for mission work in Africa, under the auspices of the "Unevangelized Tribes Mission." They are already assigned to their station, and busy learning the language, where they expect to work among the "Pigmies" of Africa.

MISSIONARY CANDIDATES

Mr. Orland Corwin, of the class of '35, has been accepted as a missionary by the Inland South America Missionary Union, and will doubtless sail this year sometime, for work in South America.

Among the graduating class this year, are a number of missionary candidates, who feel called to fields in South America, Africa, British West Indies, Armenia and Korea.

F. B. I. GIDEON BAND

The F. B. I. Gideon Band was instituted over a year ago, to assist in the training of worthy Christian Youth. Out of the thousands who were with Gideon, only three hundred were instrumental in bringing the victory. From among the thousands of friends of F. B. I., we are endeavoring to get three hundred who will give One Dollar, or more, each month for the support of the school.

To meet the actual operating expenses of the school, it is necessary to raise more than one thousand dollars each month, above the regular income. Everyone interested in the training of worthy Christian young people, for a life of service, should cooperate in this work and fellowship of the F. B. I. Gideon Band. This is an investment which will bring eternal dividends. An official membership card is issued to each member, and they will receive the school bulletin, and special news letters from the Institute. Many have already enlisted in this worthy cause, and anyone who is interested may address the President of the Institute.

SUMMER BIBLE SCHOOL

Louise Ellis

It is reported that there are more than 27,000,000 boys and girls and young people in the United States today, who are growing up without any systematic religious training whatsoever. These young people of today, will be the home builders, the fathers and mothers of tomorrow. The kind of citizens they will be, depends on the kind of training they receive while young. The three institutions which train youth are the home, the school and the church. In many of the homes, and most of the schools today, little or no attention is given to spiritual training.

The church has children such a small part of their time, even where children attend Sunday School regularly, that it makes it difficult for the church to offset the influence of the home and school, or to make up, for the lack of religious training, in these two institutions. If a child attends Sunday School, every Sunday in the year without missing, he or she is only in actual class study approximately 24 hours; or a total of one day—a precious little religious training for a whole year.

The Summer Bible School method was originated for the purpose of giving to children and young people special, intensified, Bible training, which they otherwise would not get. In the past six years more than 50,000 boys and girls have been enrolled in Summer Bible Schools, conducted by students of F. B. I. These have been held in fourteen states and the British West Indies. Thousands of children will be enrolled this summer by the graduates and students of this Institution.

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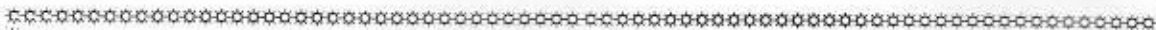
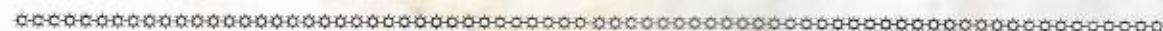
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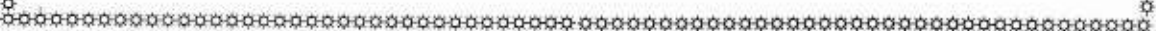
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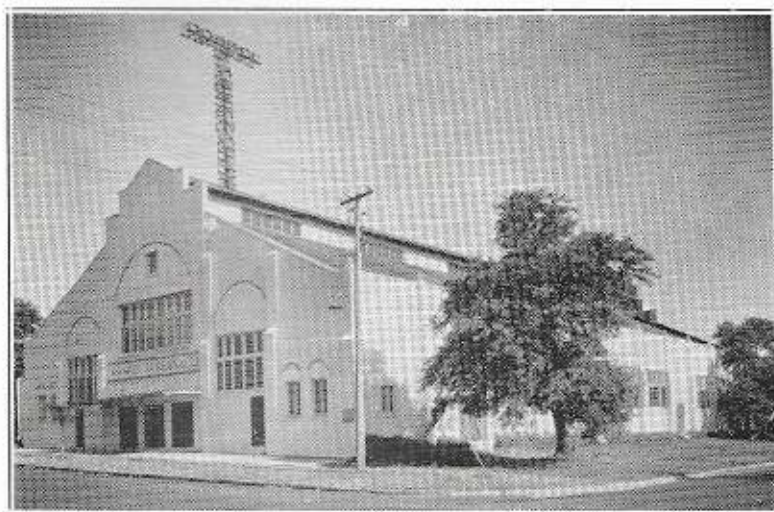
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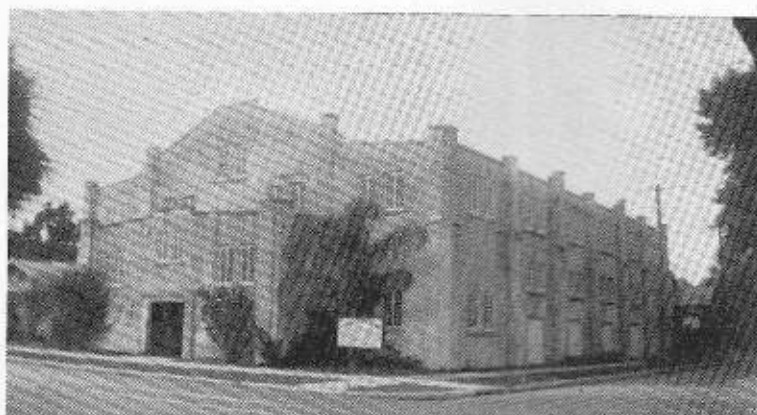
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
