FOREWORD



TRINITY COLLEGE 1932-1957



To Trinity College, the number 25 stands for a period of spiritual prosperity and success. From the time in 1932 when an ambitious young St. Petersburg preacher by the name of Rev. William T. Watson caught the burden of the necessity of a Bible school to train young people for the service of the King, to 1957 when the name Trinity College stands for a place where God and the Lord Jesus Christ are honored, and the Bible is given first place, many have passed through its sacred halls, and have trod on its holy ground to go out and become effective soul winners, and soldiers in the army of Christ.

We have chosen this, Trinity College, 1932-1957, as our theme on this our Silver Jubilee Year. Above you see the school body, faculty and students, and in the background the beautiful buildings at Temple Terrace in Tampa. At this time the school was known as Florida Fundamental Bible Institute. Friends of the school will notice on the right in the second and thirdrows, Mr. and Mrs. Markham, Dr. Aughinbaugh, and Dr. Bragg. On the left, in the second row, you will notice Dr. and Mrs. Watson and son Billy. All of these are still teaching at the school.



Continuing in chronological progress through the years, above you see a picture of the school in 1939. The school was still located at Temple Terrace in Tampa. In the middle of the first row, you will notice a tall good looking chap who later was to become the greatest evangelist of our era, and probably one of the greatest of all times. At the bottom of the page is a view of Florida Bible Institute after it had been moved to St. Petersburg on Tangerine Avenue. This was taken in 1945 during the war years which later proved to be the school's leanest years student wise in history. Later in 1951 the school moved to its present location in Clearwater where the name was changed to Trinity College.

"And look, on this page there's a picture of Pricilla and Ronnie Erisman, who are missionaries to the Auca Indians in South America. And Cathy, look at this. . Mark Corts is still working on the 1957 edition of the Beacon Year Book!!!! It says here, quote 'Well girls, we missed the deadline again' unquote!!!! That's pretty good, eh? Why, here's one of my teachers, Cathy, Lonnie Owen, a Fiery young evangelist who is reaching the masses at Moody Memorial Church in Chicago. And Carlos Steward, a Child Psychologist, still working on his theories. . .I wonder what they were?!?! I wonder if he and Mary Ann finally got married.

"Over here is Malcolm Butler and his wife, Fran. He is president of the Grace Missions in India. Cathy, did you know that that was where he was born? Oh, here's Jack Clark, he is chairman of the Christian Businessmen's Committee of Charleston, W. Va., and the proud father of five beautiful daughters. Why, there's Jo Sutley, with her charges in a leper colony in Africa, and ole Lee Graham, working in the trailor parks in the Clearwater-St. Petersburg area, I wonder how he's getting along, looks like they have a good sized family from this picture.

"Let's see what's on the next page. There's an old buddy of mine. . .Lew Clark and Marjie, He DID become a chaplain, I wonder where he's stationed. My goodness, there's Lauretta Woods, she's married to an up and coming young pastor in West Virginia. And Francis Pain is back in Cuba now. . . he took over the mission work that his mother and father started. Who's this? Oh, I remember them, Lambert and Connie Bartels, they are both teaching in a Bible College in Texas.



A PRAYER ANSWERED

It was in the year 1932 that God spoke to a young man, William T. Watson a native of North Carolina. He had an ambition in his heart to build a school from whose halls would go our spirit-filled youth carrying the Gosepl to the four corners of the earth. Fired with such a zeal he launched out on this venture of faith. On September 20, 1932, Florida Bible Institute had its beginning in a spacious country club overlooking the Hillsboro River at Temple Terrace near Tampa, Florida. This was the vision come true of the founder and president, Dr. William T. Watson. Through the years after he had been dedicated to the Lord, his mother's prayers followed him and she lived to see the vision of her son come true.

The Spring of 1943 brought a change to Florida Bible Institute. The property at Temple Terrace was sold by the officials of the school and a new home was purchased in St. Petersburg, Florida. This was an ideal location during the war years. Dr. Watson was seeking a permanent home for the school during this time. Another change took place in 1947. The curriculum and faculty of the Institute was enlarged, and the name of the school was changed to Trinity College. But there was yet another move in God's plan for Trinity. In January 1951, the Lord provided the present site for the college in Belleair on picturesque Clearwater Bay. He gave Dr. Watson another fine Country Club to convert. This one, a gambling casino where fortunes were lost nightly, has become a chapel where unsearchable riches are gained daily. One of the places used as a bar in the building before it changed hands is now used as a study lounge for the young ladies. The other bar is now used as a snack bar. The ball room is now one of the class rooms of the college. The change was so unusual that the Associated Press spread it to the nation. We often read of, hear of, or see a change in a persons life, but it is really uncommon when a building which is a stronghold of Satan is changed into a force for God. To see this place now being used exclusively for a Christian Training Center and for Winter Bible Conferences, is to feel that certainly a miracle has taken place.

As we reminisce over the pages of the past we recall the names and accomplishments of Trinity-trained workers serving in all major denominations. This is like reading an exciting page from Who's Who in the evangelical world. Through the halls of Trinity College have passed students who are now laboring as pastors, evangelists, missionaries, singers, musicians, chaplains, youth workers, children's workers, and radio artists. To name a few of these we have Mr. and Mrs. Howard Street, '37, '38, laboring in the Belgian Congo, Africa; Roy Gustafson, '37, well-known Bible teacher and Conference speaker; Howard Rich, '37, who is pastor of Unaka Avenue Baptist Church in Johnson, City, Tennessee; our own Dr. Bragg, who was president of our first graduating class, is now on the faculty of the school; Major Charles Massey, Jr., '38, and wife, Emily Cavenaugh Massey, '39, are now in Germany, Charles is an army chaplain; Don Luttrell, '51, promotional director of Calvary Baptist Missions and missionary to the West Indies.

The Bible says "teacing every man in wisdom" and so Lorence Asman, '47, is a member of the faculty of Grand Rapids Baptist Theological Seminary; and Calvin Thorpe, '51, is president of Lansing Bible Institute in Michigan.

In these days there are so many new channels for giving out the Gospel. Many alumni are using them, for instance:


L. T. "Bud" Boldt, '50, is now an outstanding Southern Evangelist; Hazel Averill Cannon, '40, founder of Camp O the Suwannee, a Christian Youth Camp, meeting the needs of youth today.

Among the special speakers and faculty members during the history of the college are the following religious leaders: Dr. W. B. Riley, Dr. H. C. Morrison, Dr. Oswald J. Smith, Dr. W. R. Newell, Dr. Albert Hughes, Billy Sunday, Dr. Homer Rodeheaver, Dr. William Evans, Dr. Gerald B. Winrod, Dr. R. A. Forrest, Dr. Donald G. Barnhouse, Dr. C. H. Tyndall, Dr. Billy Graham, Dr. J. E. Grimes, Rev. Paul Jackson, Rev. Jimmie Johnson, and many others.

Perhaps one of the days that will never be forgotten by students and friends of Trinity College was February 2, 1953. It was on this day that world famous evangelist Dr. Billy Graham returned to Trinity College. He was a student in ourschool for three and one-half years and was graduated in 1940, while the school was known as the Florida Bible Institute at Temple Terrace near Tampa. It was while Dr. Graham was a student at this school that he felt his call from God to preach the unsearchable riches of the Gospel of Christ.

As we look back over the past twenty-five years it thrills our hearts to know that through the years the school has maintained a strong stand for historic fundamental Christianity. As we enter the next twenty-five years the prayer of our hearts, as students of Trinity College, is that the Lord might continue to use us in the harvest fields of the world that we might be instrumental in bringing lost souls to a knowledge and acceptance of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

As the sunsets on a quarter century of training young people for active Christian service, we see in the horizon a limitless influence of the Gospel reaching across the seas and around the world. In this twenty-five year expanse we see hundreds of men and women who, inspired by an atmosphere consecrated to Christ, have stepped forth into a sindarkened world as vessels of shining light, and messengers of the Gospel to win lost ones who in turn have won other lost souls to Christ. In this way they have made their training at Trinity count for Him the world over.

Beyond the setting sun we see a hope. Our one message -- Christ. Our new one -- devotion to Him. We trust the Lord may use Trinity Students in future days. May God bestow His richest blessings on Trinity College till Christ comes again.
