





We take time to think, and we find That you are still on our hearts and minds. Our hearts are saddened because you are no longer here, But to us you make Heaven much more dear.







TRINITY IS . . . A FAMILY THAT WORSHIPS TOGETHER





















DR. W. T. WATSON, 1901-1981





William T. Watson was born in Lumberton, North Carolina on May 21, 1901. His father was a farmer and his mother a housewife. He was obliged during his high school years to help work on the farm and when not working on the farm was a clerk in a grocery store. His conversion at fourteen was simple but complete. The night he accepted the Lord as his Saviour, he was so excited that he forgot he had peddled his bicycle to the tent meeting and had to return to retrieve it. From this point on, William T. Watson proved that faith and hard work were inseparable. At the age of sixteen, he entered Toccoa Falls Institute and spent four years studying the Bible, supporting himself by working at many jobs. He worked on a dairy farm, drove a team of oxen, and was often a part time cook. In the fall of 1921, he entered Nyack College and graduated in 1922. Here, also, he worked his way through school.




In 1921, when Lucy Roberts enrolled at Toccoa Falls, she and William became close friends. Within a short time, their friendship blossomed into love. On June 18, 1924, Dr. Watson and Lucy were married in Greensboro, North Carolina. She was to be the strongest source of encouragement and help in Dr. Watson's life. They were later blessed with one son, Robert, and three grandchildren.





After graduating from Nyack, Dr. Watson traveled south to Florida with Dr. John Minder, lifelong friend. Together, the two formed an evangelistic team but later parted paths. In 1924, Dr. Watson felt led to organize a church in St. Petersburg while his friend chose Tampa for his pastorate. God blessed the preaching of young Watson until by the end of 1924, when he was only 23, his ever growing congregation moved from a tent full of holes into a huge 4,000 seat Gospel Tabernacle. World famous preachers and evangelists were guests of this large church: Gypsy Smith, Billy Sunday and more.




TRINITY BEGINS - 1932



As Dr. Watson pastored in the St. Petersburg Gospel Tabernacle, he had a vision of a Bible College and a Bible conference combined — allowing students to be exposed to teachers and preachers that otherwise would not be available. Vision became reality in September, 1932 as the spacious Temple Terrace Country Club was miraculously purchased in the heat of the depression. The first enrollment was 30 students. At that time, the school was called "Florida Bible Institute."







For ten years, the school of Temple Terrace grew. One of Trinity's most famous graduates, Billy Graham, attended during this time. When World War II erupted, the government claimed the property for wartime purposes, and the college was forced to relocate in St. Petersburg, using the facilities of the Gospel Tabernacle. In 1951, God made growth possible once again by the purchasing of the famed Belview Country Club in Belleair, facing Clearwater Bay. Once a gambling center for millionaires, these facilities were converted to Christian service. Florida Bible Institute became Trinity Bible College when a four year degree program was offered.

In 1960, another great miracle in faith took place. The Fenway Hotel, a winter home for millionaires in Dunedin, Florida was purchased with a \$500 down payment. Dr. Wat-son was able once again to expand his vision of a Bible College and conference grounds combined. This campus of seven acres was fully developed, and an adjoining Clearwater campus was added to the complex. In July of 1980, Dr. Watson became seriously ill but continued with increasing fervor to preach and exhort young people to "preach Jesus." His tremendous will to work for the Lord literally sustained his physical life until the Lord welcomed him Home on June 5th, 1981. Today, after fifty years, Trinity continues to carry on the principles of Christian education formed by Dr. W. T. Watson, training young people for practical Christian service.


